New Officers Look For Banner Year For Organization

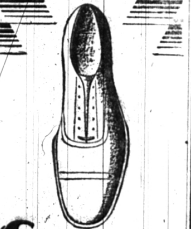
Members of the Bloomfield Hills and District Horticultural Society are expecting 1929 to be one of its banner years, according to C. W. Haven, newly elected president.

OAKLAND COUNTY FARMERS TO HAVE ADVICE OF EXPERTS

Arrangements are complete today for the services of numerous specialists of Michigan State College to be extended to aid Oakland County farmers.

Harold M. Vaughn, county agricultural agent, recently returned from East Lansing, where he arranged tours and meetings. He announces that among those to come to Oakland County during 1929 are the following:

J. W. Sims, soils specialist, will conduct fertilizer demonstration in Oakland County with particular reference to early potatoes and fruit.

J. A. Hannah and assistants will conduct two poultry schools, four brooder schools and two projects of poultry sanitation in addition to the record of performance work which is being carried on in the county at present.

In horticulture, H. A. Cardwell will conduct spray work. H. D. Hootman will conduct tree training and grafting work and in all probability a new demonstration in grafting to induce bearing in young northern apple trees.

George Starr will conduct demonstration and lecture work in vegetable gardening and Kenneth Post will conduct green house

(Concluded from Page 1) tor and hood, low, graceful lines, harmonious colors and sweeping, full crown fenders.

The new Whippet claims the distinction of the first car with "finger tip control." This feature consists of a button located in the center of the steering wheel which controls all the functions of starting the motor, operating the lights and sounding the horn. The greater convenience is pointed to in avoiding fumbling, changing of comfortable driving positions and so on by switching the rod. The one button, by manipulation, controls the starter, the horn, bright, dim and parking lights.

Artistic improvements in the Whippet models include one-piece garnish molding and paneling, chromium-plated radiator shell and head lamp rims, silvered hardware fittings, larger hub caps, beaver running boards, and a two-tone ivory instrument panel.

The new Whippet chassis is five inches longer and has a heavier more rigid frame with six cross-members. The motor has a lower gear ratio, a longer stroke and an increased compression ratio. An advance of nine horse power, making the vehicle 40 horse power, is reported. Less vibration is claimed because of the heavier seven bearing crankshaft and lighter pistons.

No great price advances have been made in any of the new models placed on the Birmingham market. The Chevrolet models vary in price some with a slight increase and others remaining the same, but with a six cylinder car instead of a four. The Pontiac price range is expected to remain practically the same.

A cut in prices is announced by Whippet dealers in comparison with the models where more was spent for equipment than is now necessary.
