Installation Complete In One Room Of Adams School Building

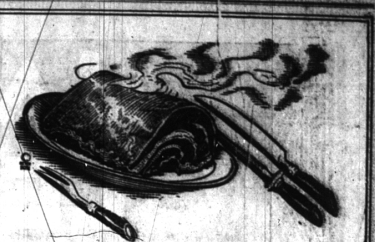

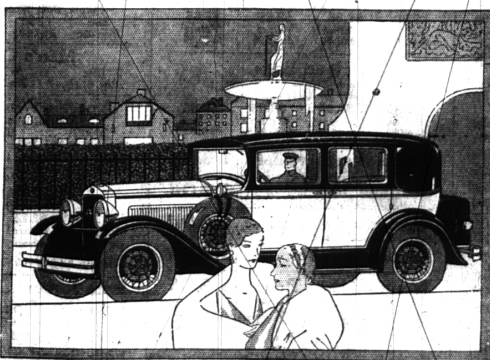
