### LESS ILLNESS TECHNICIAN SAYS

Health Laboratory For June Shows Marked Decrease In Amount of Activity

Marked decrease in the amount of illness in Birmingham is seen by the report of the village health department, made public today. This is attributed by Miss Clara Diekmann, laboratory technician, to the warm weather. "There is less illness in the summer because children are in the open air and sunshine. There are fewer contacts with other children as in the school session," she said.

The number of water tests during the month of June is more than triple that of May, however, with 60 tests shown for last month against 17 for May.

During June 233 laboratory tests were made, 110 of these being throat cultures. Records for May show a total of 417 tests with 321 throat cultures. Forty-three milk tests and 520 miscellaneous analyses.
