AUTOISTS PAY HEAVY FINES DURING JUNE

Total of \$2,030.20 Levied For Violators in Birmingham And Hills Village

Congested traffic of the mid-summer season has brought a corresponding increase in the number of law-breakers appearing before Justice Floyd S. Buck during June.

Fines paid during June in Buck's court by law violators in the village, state and Bloomfield Hills totaled \$2,030.20. The Hills Village was in the lead on this with fines amounting to \$1,235 collected from 43 arrests.

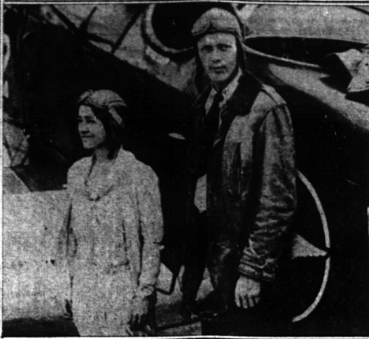
Twenty eight of these persons were found guilty of disorderly conduct, paying fines totaling \$710, while 14 paid total fines of \$300 on reckless driving charges. One person was fined for violation of traffic light regulations.

Five persons arrested in the village of Birmingham are serving jail terms. Four of these sentences were handed out by Buck for disorderly conduct. Ten other persons arrested on a similar charge paid fines totaling \$225. One drunken driver received a 30 day sentence and a \$50 fine. Twenty speeding cases brought \$235, total fines collected in Birmingham amounting to \$397.20.

Fines collected in the state and paid in Buck's court totaled \$416. Five persons were arrested for disorderly conduct with total fines of \$190 and one is serving a 60 day sentence in the Oakland County jail. Fines amounting to \$174 were paid by violators of the state game laws with 13 persons arrested on this charge. A drunken driver is serving a 60 day jail term.

WILL SELECT JURY FOR CIVIC CENTER

Six Parcels Of Land Sought By Village Commission To Complete Project

A jury of 12 people will be selected tomorrow in local Justice Court to make a final award to property owners involving six parcels of land in the center block of the civic center, the trial for which will be started early next week, stated village attorney Clarence Ogden yesterday. Justice F. S. Buck will preside. John J. Gaffill, of Southfield avenue, represents several of the property owners.

A conference between Ogden and Gaffill was held last Friday, at which time Mr. Gaffill sought to

settle the matter out of court; however, Mr. Ogden opposed such procedure, and asked for the jury trial, a customary procedure in such situations.

Money for the six parcels was refused in a bond issue which Birmingham voters opposed last spring. The village commission, however, feels that the six parcels of land are of vital necessity to the civic center, and believe that re-submission of a bond issue to the electorate will meet with their approval at a future time.

Property involved is part of the three block center, set aside for village purposes, and the owners are: John H. Laidlaw and wife, Jessie, two parcels; Burt Messie, Henry and First State Bank, two parcels; and Rose Baird, Jay F. Hunt and wife, Laura, two parcels.

Merrill Street Cost Given Out Monday, July 22

Persons interested in learning the amount of money they will be required to pay as a special assessment for the proposed opening of Merrill street, from Pierce to Woodward avenue, are to be given an opportunity when the village commission meets Monday evening, July 22. At that time village assessor Albert W. Noonan will have a new assessment roll of the project prepared, in which the village at large will pay 40 per cent, instead of 15 per cent, under a former plan of assessment.

Last week, at the commission meeting, a difference of opinion was expressed by affected taxpayers relative to the necessity of the opening, and it is expected that the meeting July 22 will bring out further debate.

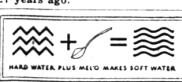
The opening in question, will continue Merrill street from its juncture at Pierce street, next to the municipal building, through to Woodward avenue; it is designed to open up the civic center to Woodward avenue and to relieve heavy traffic at Woodward and West Maple avenues.

Total cost of obtaining the land amounts to \$75,000.74, while the cost of the street improvement, such as sewers, pavement, curb, etc., is estimated at \$15,267.00. Birmingham will pay 40 per cent of the first amount, or \$31,022.95, and one-sixth of the latter amount, or \$2,541.82.
