HISTORICAL COLOR OF MACKINAC ISLAND ATTRACTS MANY ANNUALLY

Mackinac Island, July 11.—Summer has brought Mackinac Island to life again and nine steamship lines are bringing visitors here some to stay only a few hours, some a few days and others to remain all summer.

Unfurling commanding the eye of every visitor who enters Mackinac Island, the island's tiny harbor, are Old Fort Mackinac on the island's east bluff and the Grand hotel on the west bluff.

Fort Mackinac, reminiscent of Gibraltar through its lofty position, was built by the British in 1780. Time has dealt kindly with the old fort and the stockade of cedar logs which once extended from blockhouse to blockhouse is the only major part of the defenses which the years have removed.

The old-world quaintness which pervades the island is especially noticeable at the fort. When the long climb to its battlements is done and the visitor steps through one of its gates he is whisked back a hundred years or more.

Electric lights and the telephone and plumbing have come to Fort Mackinac and tree growth has made it prettier than of old, but except for this the hurry of time has passed it by.

Seventeen hundred of the 2,200 acres of Mackinac Island are owned by the State of Michigan and comprise Mackinac Island State Park. The casual visitor to the island only treads the surface of Mackinac's charms.

British Landing, Robinson's Folly, Lover's Leap, the Battle Field, Fort Holmes and Skull are but only a few of the stories and legends of Mackinac Island.

Capital of the great Northwest Territory when no white man knew just what that vast territory was, Mackinac Island was one of the most important points of civilization in the infancy of the United States.

Mackinac's population is of Irish, French and Indian extraction, with the Irish in heavy predominance. Most of the islanders are related; "About sixty-five per cent anyway," according to Mayor George B. Chambers.
