CRASH VICTIMS ARE RECOVERING

People Injured in 147 Local Auto Accidents Reported Improved

Recovery is seen today for the victims of the four accidents which marked last week in Birmingham as one of the worst in the history of the village, according to hospital attendants. Mrs. Ina Wilhelm and her son, Warren, 17, of Franklin village who sustained serious injuries, July 8, when their machine crashed into a string of empty freight cars at the Pere Marquette crossing on the Twissie Mile road, are reported recovering in the Pontiac City hospital. They will be released Saturday, hospital attendants say. Eugene Wilhelm, husband of Mrs. Ina Wilhelm and prominent Detroit architect, was killed in the crash. Mrs. George Fulber, of 15409 Greenlawn avenue, Detroit, and H. Ladd, Birmingham, secretary of Shirley street, Pontiac, were also released from the St. Joseph's hospital, Pontiac, and are reported recovering. The former was riding with her husband, George Fulber, of 15409 Greenlawn avenue, Detroit, when an interurban crashed into their car on Woodward avenue. The accident resulted in sustained fatal injuries and died shortly after reaching the hospital. Mrs. Corby is the only survivor of the automobile crash, July 8, at Woodward avenue and Quorum road in which her husband, Emery, and her brother, Frank Harrington, of Pierce street, Birmingham, were almost instantly killed.

518 Cases Helped Today the Oakland County Chapter is taking care of 223 crippled children; 24 are in hospitals, 31 wearing braces, seven in casts, and 28 wearing special shoes, pointed out Mr. Ladd. From July 1st year to July 1st this year the County Chapter has given 2,449 treatments to crippled children, making a total of 1211 some falls; in the past four years 6,694 treatments have been given at Oakland County, 5,848 home calls having been made. In the four years 18 cases have been investigated. A total of \$14,738.63 has been expended by the County Chapter in four years. Eight children from Birmingham and nearby are being treated by the Chapter nurses today.

Miss Leola B. Jacques is in charge of physiotherapy work for the County Chapter, being assisted by Miss Helen Stuckley in the Royal Oak territory.

As the result of activity in Oakland County to obtain better advantages for crippled children education, Pontiac has given over one school room to them, Royal Oak has given one, and other school rooms starting this fall, and it is expected the same thing will be done in Birmingham schools when advisable.

Cut Trees Later The village, through its attorney, Clare H. Ogden, is now preparing data prior to instituting condemnation proceedings for ten feet of land on each side of East Maple avenue; this land will be used for such a widening demands the widening of the pavement, when the trees would, say officials, have to be cut down. The proposed street will be 86 feet wide, instead of its present width of 66 feet. The new width will determine the new building line, thus saving the village excessive costs of condemnation later, as would be the case if they do not go ahead with the present plan.

Interested property owners will be given a chance to be heard in a local Justice Court when the case is called in August, said Mr. Ogden. In the meantime, unless property owners are able to sway the commission from its present plan, it appears that some day in the future the old trees that give this important thoroughfare its name will fall under the axe.

LINCOLN AVENUE TO GET CONCRETE

Village Officials Act On 18-Ft. Strip From Pierce To Southfield

Action on the laying of a strip of concrete pavement 18 feet wide on Lincoln avenue, between Pierce street and Southfield avenue, was started Monday night when the commission instructed village assessor Albert W. Noonan to prepare a tax assessment district to cover the cost of the improvement, estimated at \$14,779.05. Abutting property will pay \$10,571.79, or at the rate of \$24.00 per front foot; the village at large will pay the remainder, or \$4,207.46.

Included in the Lincoln avenue improvement also is the installation of proper drainage structures costing \$5,260.38; of this amount the commission instructed village assessor Albert W. Noonan to prepare a tax assessment district to cover the cost of the improvement, estimated at \$14,779.05.

Monday evening, July 29, is the date set for the public hearing on this improvement. The 18 ft. strip proposed is proposed instead of a full width street, which exists from Woodward to Pierce street, because of the inability of much of the vacant abutting property to stand its greater share of the cost. When completed, Lincoln avenue is expected to relieve traffic on West Maple avenue, village officials say.

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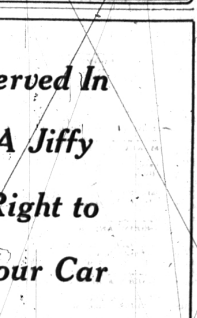
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
