A petition, signed by 60 residents of south Birmingham, on both sides of Woodward avenue, asking for the installation of a traffic signal light at Woodward avenue and Adams avenue, where it crosses the Grand Trunk railroad, was presented to the village commission Monday night. The commission took the matter under advisement.

It was pointed out that several fatalities have occurred at Woodward and Adams avenues during the past year or two, and that women and children find it almost impossible to cross Woodward at that point because of constant traffic. The only difficulty surrounding the installation of a light there was a traffic signal light was set for traffic to cross the tracks with a train coming from either direction, was a point raised.

### 1913 CHEVROLET IS GOING STRONG

A chicken calling contest attracted almost as much attention as the pin throwing, largely because of the calling of Mrs. Lemuel Fortes of South Lyon, Mary. The women were highly proud in this art but none could make the chickens mind in the way Mrs. Fortes did.

Committees which arranged for the affair were James S. Mitchell, Holly, president of the farm, his rear, general chairman; Lee Noble and William Sinton, athletic committee, and Miss Elizabeth Weid, Miss Ethel M. Kingshot and Mr. and Mrs. Harold Vaughn, dancing committee.

The old fashioned dancing provided a center of entertainment for a large number of the guests. An orchestra playing old dance selections furnished the music. Dancing was held in an old barn at the park.

On several occasions Wilks has hitched a trailer to "Spark Plug" and pulled a load of 2,000 pounds, plus the 85 pounds which the trailer weighs, all the way to San Antonio, 125 miles distant.

No hill in the section is too tough for "Spark Plug," and Wilks says that it is sufficiently economical, continuing to give as good as 20 miles to the gallon.

One objection, however, is lodged against it by Wilks and this is a friendly one. It is his complaint against the crowd which his car invariably attracts when he drives it into San Antonio.

"Spark Plug" had many owners—eight to be exact—before Wilks purchased it from Vogt Chevrolet Company of Schulenburg, Texas, nine years ago. For four years he got splendid service from the 1913 motor which might yet be encased beneath the 1913 hood but for an accident which occurred five years ago.

At that time a 1917 Chevrolet owned by one of Wilks' brothers caught fire and its chassis was destroyed. The motor was unharmed so it was decided to give "Spark Plug's" original motor a well deserved rest and substitute the newer one.

"Spark Plug's" total mileage is indeterminate. Since Wilks has had it, three speedometers have been in use. One registered 75,000 miles, a second 60,000 and the present one has run up 15,000.

The total repair bill during Wilks' nine years ownership has been \$100. In this connection, however, it might be stated that Wilks does all his own repairing. Recently he new rings which he placed in the car and other minor adjustments made.

All the Wilkses are mechanically inclined and all prefer the Chevrolet.

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### Milford Musician Funeral Tuesday

Following an illness of about two years, Glen B. Scarce, 32 years old, prominent Milford musician, formerly a member of the teaching staff of the Pontiac Institute Conservatory, and the Detroit Conservatory of Music, died at his home early Monday.

Mr. Scarce was a native of Walled Lake and had lived practically all his life in his community. He was a violinist of repute, and was heard often in musical affairs of the district. He studied for years with Prof. Leggett and with Hoffman at Boston, Mass., and was active, musically, as well as holding the post of trustee in the Milford Methodist Church.

Surviving are his parents, Mr. and Mrs. George Scarce and his grandmother, Mrs. Lee, all of Milford.

Funeral was held Wednesday at 2:30 p. m. at the home with Rev. Otto Lyon, Methodist pastor, and Rev. H. P. Seebastrop, of Howell, formerly of Milford, in charge. Burial was in Oak Grove cemetery.
