

### LAKE ORION GETS AIRPORT PROJECT

Well Known Detroit, Pontiac, and Other Citizens Form Holding Company

A movement involving the formation of a \$50,000.00 corporation to finance an airport for Lake Orion is seen in the recent meeting of prominent Detroit, Pontiac, and Lake Orion men last week, resulting in the Lake Orion Airport, Inc. Frank W. Blair, president of the Union Trust Co. who has a large summer home near Lake Orion, and William Scripps, Jr., are two of those interested in the airport plan.

The corporation has already purchased 20 acres southwest of Lake Orion from Miss Villa Flunier for \$25,000.00. Stock is being issued at \$10.00 per share. Paul Oren, attorney of Detroit, has charge of the legal arrangements for the new company. Officers and directors are: President, Lee C. Anderson. Vice-president, O. F. Letts.

### RAY COLLINS NEW STATE AIR CHIEF

Birmingham Man Appointed by Governor Green To Aerodromes Board

Appointment of Captain Ray Collins as director of the newly created state board of aerodromes was made during the past month by Governor Fred W. Green, confirming recommendation by the board at their first in-

formal meeting. Captain Collins and his family reside at 711 Abbey road, in the village. The recommendation was presented to the governor by William B. Mayo, chief engineer of the department for the Union Trust Company, as chairman of the board.

Mr. Collins is also manager for the 1929 National Air Tour, and has served as referee for the tour each year since its inception in 1925. As manager of the publicity department for the Union Trust Company he devotes his time to aviation missionary work, usually making as many as four speeches in a week. He flies wherever he goes.

During the war he was an instructor in combat flying at the Advanced School of Issoudun, France, later going into active service on the front with a pursuit group. After the armistice, he was stationed at Selfridge field until a student he was instructing fainted 8,000 feet up and jammed the controls, causing a crash that ended Collins' army flying.

As director of the state board, Collins will undoubtedly be charged with development of the state airports which Governor Green proposes to construct. Official action on the part of the board will not be taken until after August 29, at which time the law appointing them becomes effective. Captain Collins' connection with the Hawks, who set a new record when he flew from coast to coast and back in 36 hours, are going to take off either from Pontiac or Ford Airports this week, Thursday, on the Pashending Trip for the 1929 National Air Tour. They will use Captain Hawks' ship to make the trip, having been delayed for the past week on account of repairs on the historical ship which was cracked up at Roosevelt Field on his return trip from California.

### New Briggs Bldg. To Cost \$125,000

A building permit was to be issued today to the Briggs Commercial and Development company for a one-story building, designed for the later addition of three stories to be constructed at the southeast corner of Woodward and Maple avenues at an approximate cost of \$125,000, Donald C. Egbert, village building inspector, announced. Work has already started on the structure which is to front 150 feet on Woodward avenue and 189 feet on east Maple. Already three prominent chain stores have signed leases for location in the building.

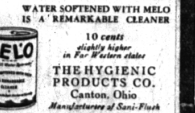

### COUNT SHOWS FAWN INCREASE

This year's fawn crop promises to be up to the average, according to the June track count on the state game refuge. It is still somewhat early for fawns to travel with their mothers and the July count will probably provide a closer check. Thus far this year the Crawford refuge near Grayling shows a fawn percentage of fifteen, while the average for the past two years on all counts was twenty per cent. The count maintained over a number of years should provide an unusually accurate index of wild animal increase or decrease.

Not only are deer and fawn tracks listed but also elk, bear, coyotes, lynx, bob cats, and others. The cleared fire lines surrounding the refuges facilitate the count to a considerable degree by providing a definite line, fifteen to thirty feet wide, over which game must pass in entering or leaving the area. Tracks going both ways are recorded.

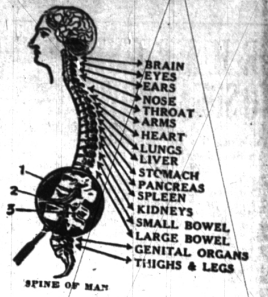
