**NEW PROCESS OF BREAD MAKING DIRECTLY FROM GRAIN FOUND**  
 Although machinery has replaced the manual process of bread-making has remained the same from the early days of history. To become breaded wheat has always traveled from the threshing-floor to the flour-mill, and thence to the dough-board and the baker's oven.  
 Are all these stages necessary? A Continental scientist named Gross says the flour stage is not only unnecessary, but wasteful, and he has discovered a process of making dough directly from the grain.  
 Separate milling and cost of packing and transporting between the mill and the mill, the mill and the baker, are eliminated. Instead, two interlinked machines are installed in the bakery, into one of which is fed the grain, to emerge from the other as dough ready for kneading.  
 The wheat goes first of all into a grain-removing machine, in which the grains receive a strenuous shaking in hot water for about half an hour. Thence they pass into a cold-water reservoir, through which compressed air is forced, stirring up the grain and carrying away the separated husks. Here the grain is cleaned in 10 minutes.  
 From the bottom of the reservoir the grain is released on to a volfr mill in which it is crushed into dough. Salt and yeast are added, during the crushing and if necessary water, but as a rule the grain absorbs sufficient water in the husking process. The dough, it emerges from the mill, is ready for mixing and baking in the ordinary way.  
 The bread is wholesome, indigestible husks are removed, but the valuable bran is retained, and more bread is produced from a given quantity of grain than is possible when wheat passes through a flour-mill.  
 A hundredweight of grain yields about 125 pounds of bread by the ordinary process of sowing/grinding and dough-making, whereas the same quantity of what will make 150 pounds of bread by the Gross process.
