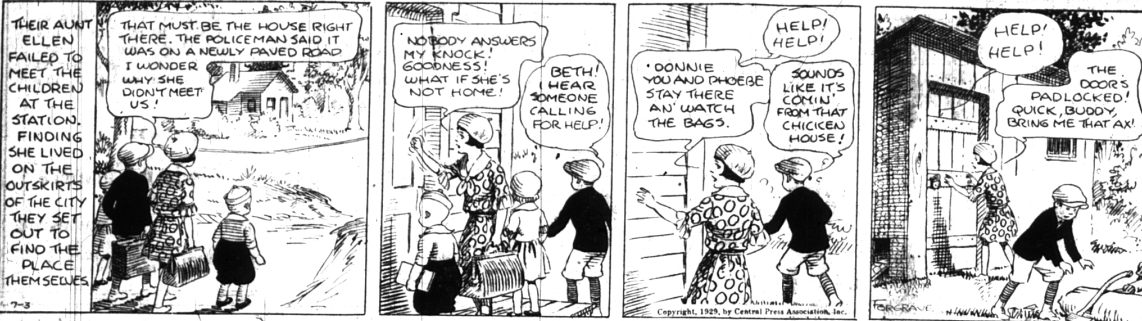

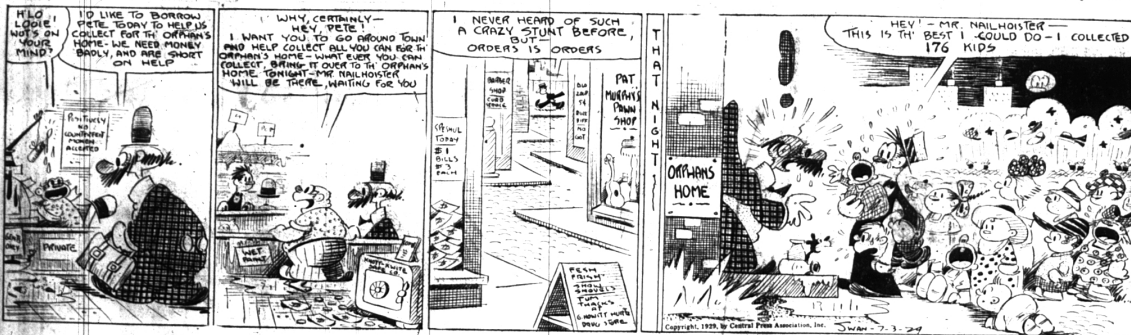

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Village Taxes
Due
July 1st, 1929

NOTICE is hereby given that Village Taxes for the fiscal year 1929 are due and payable at the office of the Village Treasurer July 1, 1929.

Payable without penalty up to and including July 31, 1929.

One per cent penalty from August 1 to September 1, 1929, inclusive. Four per cent penalty from September 1 to October 31, 1929, inclusive. No taxes accepted by Village Treasurer after October 31, 1929, as the tax roll will be in the hands of the County Treasurer at Pontiac for collection. All taxes unpaid after October 31, 1929, will bear the four per cent penalty plus three-quarters of one per cent for each additional month or fraction thereof.
