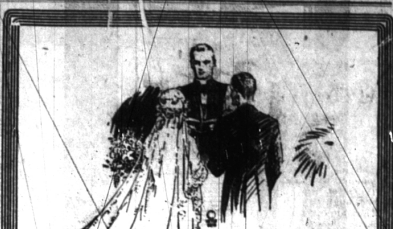
A luncheon bridge today opens the season of monthly bridges at the Pine Lake Country club.

Twilight Rides are replacing the Musical Rides at the Bloomfield Open Hunt Club. Members set out at 6:30 p. m. returning

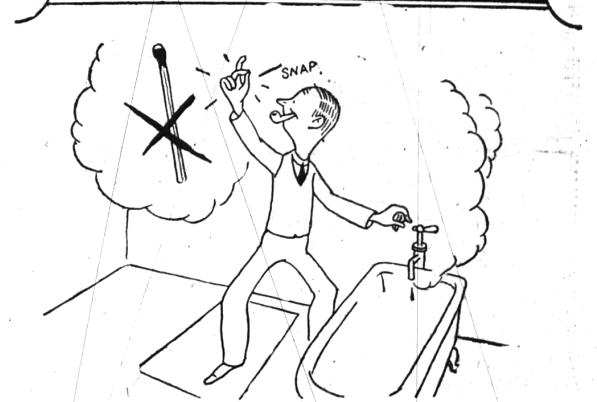
