Suspects, Arrested in Bloomfield Hills, Fined in Court

Two Flint men, arrested in Bloomfield Hills after Patrolman James Banks fired several shots at them fleeing car, are at liberty today after paying \$50 fines in Justice Floyd S. Buck's court. They are Irving Aronson and Theodore Engle, both 21. They pleaded guilty to being disorderly. They ignored the commands of Banks to halt before he opened fire.

BREAK GROUND FOR WIDE ROAD TO THE NORTH

Work is under way today on the new Northwestern highway, planned to run from Detroit to Ludington, in northern Michigan, following its start Monday afternoon.

The first 10 miles of pavement, which extends as far as the Orchard Lake and Fourteen Mile roads, will be completed this season. It is expected. The pavement will be laid in two 20 foot strips over a 204 foot right of way and approaches Franklin village. Judge Ira Jayne was in charge of the program attendant upon the start of paving operation by McKay contractors of Detroit.

BIRMINGHAM NOW MARKED FOR AIRSHIPS

Three Birmingham boy scouts today have completed work on the painting of a huge sign in the village for the direction of airships.

Located atop the Lawson Erb Lumber company near the Grand Trunk railway and east Maple avenue, the word "Birmingham" is painted in letters 12 feet long. The word covers 90 feet of space and will be visible from an altitude of 5,000 feet.

It is a regulation air marking sign and also shows the distance and directions for the nearest landing field which is at Maple and Crooks roads. The scouts who did the work are members of Troop 4. They are: Robert Marlotte, Fred Johnson and Bruce Harrison.

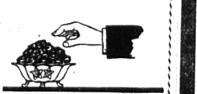
