Launch Equality Drive
Economic and political equality between men and women is the subject of a campaign to be launched by the Open Door Council at a conference in Berlin on June 15 and 16, to which the National Woman's Party will send three delegates. This conference will meet immediately before the International Alliance of Women for Suffrage and Equal Citizenship.

The Open Door Council was organized three years ago by the radical wing of the World Suffrage Association in Paris, when they were denied full participation in the convention. Thirteen countries are represented on the council. The chairman of the Open Door Council is Mrs. Elizabeth Abbott of London. Members from the United States are Mrs. Jane Norman Smith of New York, Miss Mabel Veriton of Delaware, Miss Doris Stevens of New York, The American delegates are: Miss Marguerite Smith and Miss Alma Lutz of Boston and Mrs. Ruth Vanderbilt of New York.

HOUSEHOLD HINTS

MENU HINT
Iced Tomato Cocktail
Baked Ham Asparagus on Toast
Green Peppers and Cottage Cheese Salad

Tapica Cream with Strawberries
Ward's
This menu is intended for a luncheon. It is appropriate for a guest luncheon, even for a shower luncheon for a bride. It is also a menu that those of your friends who are counting calories may eat without fear—providing, of course, that they don't take seconds and helpings. Tomato juice cocktail may be purchased at the grocery stores or made at home of seasoned and chilled tomato juice.

Today's Recipes
Cheese and Pepper Salad—Two green peppers, one package cream cheese, lettuce hearts, two tablespoons mayonnaise, one-half teaspoon paprika. Remove the seeds carefully from the peppers, after cutting out the stems. Fill them with the cheese, which has been well mixed with the mayonnaise and paprika. Place them in the ice until they are thoroughly chilled. Then slice them crosswise, lay on the lettuce leaves and garnish with a little additional dressing.

Tapica Cream—Six tablespoons quick cooking tapica, two cups water, one and one-half tablespoons lemon juice, one cup strawberries, two egg whites, pinch of salt. Cook the tapica in the water (salted) in a double boiler until it is transparent. Then remove it from the fire and stir in the lemon juice. When it is almost cold, fold in the stiffly beaten egg whites and pour over the washed and hulled strawber-

Better Than Manufactured Jam? CONSERVE

(Mrs. Mary Morton's Weekly Tested Recipe)
Four quart boxes red currants, two boxes red raspberries, one pound raisins, six small oranges, two lemons. Slice oranges and lemons very fine (skin and all), and for every cup of fruit

should be planned beforehand by a competent committee. The preparation of the various articles on the menu may they be allotted to volunteers, and there will be no unnecessary duplications or omissions. Some hot foods like bacon, steak, wienies, or rounds of hamburger wrapped in bacon may be cooked on the ground.

Coffee may be cooked when wanted or prepared in thermos bottles. On the whole, however, cold foods and beverages will be found easiest to manage for a large group of people, especially on a warm day. Minced and mixed foods which might easily spoil are best avoided, either as separate dishes or in sandwiches. Salad ingredients may be carried separately, packed with a little ice, and put together at the picnic.

Blankets should be washed or vacuum cleaned and hung in the open air before wrapping in moth-proof paper. If kept in a moth-proof closet they need simply be packed on the shelf. Wool garments should be carefully dusted, or, better still, should be vacuum cleaned and packed in cedar chests or moth-proof bags.

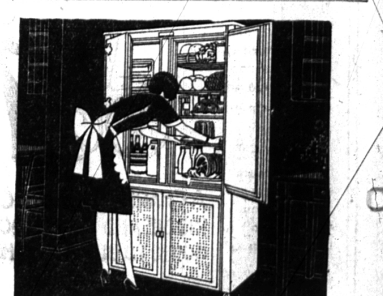
