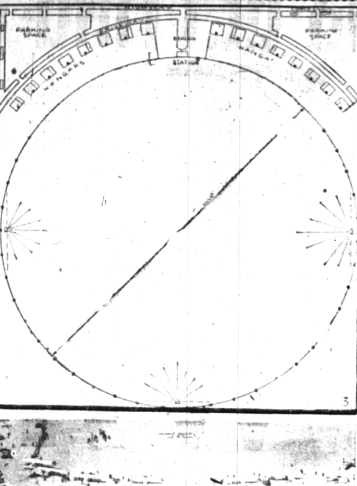

VARIED EQUIPMENT NEEDED FOR AIRPORT

It, too, should be kept clear of obstructions in the form of buildings or natural hazards.

Third Type
The third type port suggested by William E. Arthur, New York aeronautic engineer, requires an area of 240 acres, of which 162 acres are given over to runways, leaving 78 acres to be devoted to concession revenue. Maintenance is necessary there for 162 acres of the port, this area requiring surfacing. The layout is in the form of a great circle, with the port offices and beacon located at one point on the circle, conference and tie hangers strung along on either side. belief. There is must in the way of equipment that is necessary. Engine shops, sailmakers' shops, shops for rigging, telegraphically and control stations, wireless station, administrative offices—all become necessary, sooner or later, to the efficient airport. Care should be taken that none of these obstruct the runways, and that the wireless mast, which can be located a good distance from the field, does not become a hazard to the flyers. The control tower needs be high enough only to command a good view of the port and the hangars.

Saving Time important
Again, the necessity of saving of time cannot be too greatly stressed. And so the closer the port to the city the better, especially from the viewpoint of commercial aviation, where speed between the population and business centers of two cities is most essential if the port is to compete with the railroads for passenger service.
