DOLLARS TO MILLIONS

Mother Named Internal Revenue Collector



It was a job of keeping track of dollars then. Now it's millions. But the slight difference of the matter of dollars isn't going to stump her, she says, and anyway, Mrs. Blackledge, her "predecessor," did it.

"If a person can run a home in a sound business way it's quite possible for her to run a great government department," declares the successful nominee for the internal revenue position confirmation of which has just been announced by the United States senate.

Mrs. Blackledge is the mother of a 19-year-old boy, a senior in a military academy. Her husband is a Chicago druggist and her uncle was the late Governor Tanner of Illinois. She looks not a day over 30 herself, and is, her friends declare, a combination of a good mixer, a sound business executive, and the kind of mother who is a pal to her son.

"My confirmation has just been announced," Mrs. Blackledge said, "and about all I can say at this time is that all the ability in the world is not wrapped up in one person, man or woman.

"I have been interested in politics since my childhood down on a farm in Clay county, Ill. After I got through school, I taught for three years. Then I started to manage a home.

"The butcher, the grocer and the baker do business in much the same fashion as the banker, the real estate man or the manufacturer. The chief difference lies in the kind of wares each sells and the magnitude of their transactions.

Scrambled Eggs—Whole Wheat Toast—Coffee

Unless you have a very large family the recipe for macaroni salad can be at least cut in half. Cook all the package, however, use what you need for the salad and the rest for the macaroni and cheese supper dish.

Today's Recipes
Macaroni Salad—One package macaroni, one cup onion, one cup diced celery, one cup shredded cabbage, two chopped pimientos, two teaspoon chopped parsley, one teaspoon salt, mayonnaise. Cook macaroni in boiling salted water until tender. Drain cool. Add other ingredients. Serve very cold on lettuce.

Apple Pudding—One cup sugar, one tablespoon butter, one egg, one cup milk, two teaspoons baking powder, two cups flour. Cut apples in eighths and spread a layer on top.

Butter Scotch Hard Sauce—One cup light brown sugar, one-third cup butter, one egg yolk, one tablespoon milk. Cream the butter, add the sugar gradually and beat until very light. Add egg yolks and milk and beat well.
