FROCKS NOW GO PLUS AND MINUS SLEEVES

Fashion interest so long focused on skirts is now drawn to sleeves. The rest of the silhouette is neatly well set. Aside from details of handling there will be no change in the silhouette itself for some time. But styles in sleeves are changing. To begin with, sleeves may be either minus or plus, both for afternoon and sports frocks, while for evening wear one of the latest notes is the long sleeved frock.

In the more individualized frocks with sleeves, the style element is very pronounced, as exemplified in the latest Paris models. There is, for instance, a definite effort to introduce fullness in sleeves by means of ruffles, or flounces, panels and slashes.

The vogue for the lingerie touches on frocks has suggested an ingenious idea for an organy cuff on mousquetaire lines, reach-

ing to the elbow and buttoned up the side. All sorts of ideas in cur decorations are appearing, and some of the more dressy ensembles have their coat sleeves slashed to show a bit of the frock sleeve beneath. So much for these more dressy types of frocks.

Palm Beach has made the sleeveless sports frock quite the thing for warmer weather—or is the vogue for the short unlined jacket responsible? With the sleeveless frocks and the short jacket one can appear properly dressed for town wear without exposing bare arms. So why the added warmth under the coat when we want to cultivate as much sunburn as possible anyway?

The sketch shows three versions of the sleeveless sports costume.

The first is a Paris version of the sleeveless tennis frock, very feminized with its side pleated skirt extending in fine tucks up on the bodice, its tucks at the shoulder and its V neckline finished with a jabot. The frock is white, the jabot and belt edged with bright red. The second model is also in red and white, the frock being white with red trimmings, while the collarless jacket is in Patent red. The third model shows the combination of figured and monotone material in the ensemble, which is one of the season's strong fashion notes. The skirt is dark blue and gray plaid, while the somewhat longer than the usual jacket is in a dark blue monotone. The blouse features the bow draped neckline and snugly fitted hip.

SUNBURN NOW IS POPULAR

So Clothes Are Designed To Blend With Summer Tints

The continued vogue for sunburned femininity, so popular during the past summer, has brought in a group of orange-red, red-orange and the entire gamut of red and rose tones as feature colors for this spring and summer.

Rose-pivoine is one of the newest shades launched on the Riviera, a soft, rose-rose color which makes charming combinations with black or gray. Patent yellow. They stand out conspicuously in all types of costumes shown at this popular show, particularly those designed for sports and evening wear where the sunburned skin would be most in evidence.

Bois de rose tint has returned after an eclipse of several seasons and it seems to have renewed vigor and freshness. Poppy-red will be popular, according to predictions. A charming model in crepe de Chine seen at a Ritz too recently has an elaborate pattern of frills torn from the width of crepe de Chine and left with rough edges.

Reels with a yellowish tinge like vermillion are making way, too, abounding in all the chic collections, as well as raspberry tints which are the ensemble—in chiffon, tulle and marquisette, some having a border trimming of beads.
