KUNSKY-BIRMINGHAM
Today Colleen Moore's present picture, "Synthetic Sin," is the seventh story to be adapted for her from a stage play. It is being shown at the Kunsky-Birmingham theatre today.

Friday and Saturday
"Silks and Saddles," a picture-ization of "the sport of Kings," is filled with scenes of the turf and of the many events which lead up to the running of an important horse race. The picture stars Marian Nixon, and is a screen adaptation of a George Beaumont story.

Sunday and Monday
Blood-curdling cries, startling shrieks, dull thuds, sepulchral tones and all the other chilling sounds of a mystery play are promised at the Kunsky-Birmingham when "The Last Warning" opens for a two day run, March 31 and April 1. WILSON
"The Front Page," the high-toned newspaper play which ranks as the outstanding dramatic hit of the season in New York, will be presented by Jed Harris at the Wilson Theatre, Detroit, beginning Easter Sunday night, March 31. The company coming here is a special one organized for Chicago where it has just terminated a three months run.

The play, still the reigning hit in New York, was written by Ben Hecht and Charles MacArthur, both former Chicago newspapermen who drew largely on their experiences in drafting this comedy drama hit. VILLAGE ASKS CONDEMNATION
Action Taken When Disagreement Arises On Woodward Land Buy

Condemnation proceedings in regard to the Standard Oil company for 10 feet of land at Hamilton and Woodward avenues will be started by the village, it was ordered by the commission at the meeting Monday night.

The action followed receipt of a letter from the company which refused the offer of \$11,000 for the land made by the village.

The company said the land which fronts on Woodward avenue, would not be surrendered for less than \$13,500 plus the cost of moving an oil station which now is on this site.

The land is needed for completion of the widening of Hamilton avenue. The station would be moved 10 feet north.
