MAN, WIFE GET HEAVY SENTENCE

Too Many Arrests Result In One To Two Year Terms For Drunkenness

James Vernon, 48, and his wife, Lillian Vernon, 50 years old, of Pontiac, are today serving terms of from one to two years in prison, following their pleas of guilty to their third drunken and disorderly charge when arraigned in circuit court, Pontiac, before Judge Frank L. Covert.

Vernor was sent to the State Reformatory at Ionia, while his wife was given a similar sentence at the Detroit House of Correction. In each instance the minimum term was recommended.

Both entered pleas of guilty when arraigned last week in Justice Floyd S. Buck's court. Because of several previous convictions on the same charge during the year, the man and woman were bound over to circuit court.

Myers, Fla.—From the squad of players working out these days under the banner of the Philadelphia Athletics, a football team of near All-American strength might well be organized overnight. And included in the 11 men selected would be Bill Breckinridge, late of Dartmouth, although Breckinridge quit college at the close of his sophomore year.

But this is about Breckinridge, the baseball player, so to that angle of it first. The Athletics and St. Louis Cardinals, champions of the National league last year, hooked up in the first of the season's exhibition games in the Florida training camp region. Breckinridge pitched the game for the Athletics, and acquitted himself in creditable fashion in the box. In addition to this he cracked over a ringing triple in a vain effort to start a rally that would overcome the two-run lead of the Cardinals crew.

That triple brought back the memory of another game to the young pitcher—a game that prevented him hanging up a perfect record in his final year as hurler for the Big Green team at Hanover.

Breckinridge won nine and lost one game for Dartmouth last year. That one defeat wasn't at the hands of a college team. Dartmouth journeyed to Quantico, Vt., to play the Quantico Marines. Dartmouth took the lead early in the game and held it. The score was 4 to 2 in Dartmouth's favor as they went into the last couple of innings. Then two errors by the Dartmouth infield put two of the Marines on base.

Up came a big left-handed hitter. Now southpaw hitters, by the laws of baseball, are due to hit toward right field. The Dartmouth outfield shifted toward that garden to be set for him.

Breckinridge had him two strikes and no balls when the third pitch went a bit wide. The jolly marine swung in desperation, caught the ball on the very tip of his bat and drove a screeching liner down the third base line, past the left fielder tearing frantically toward the foul line to field it, and to the fence. The batter rapped home standing up—with the two runners jogging ahead of him. Final score, 5 to 4, Marines.

Breckinridge played end on the Dartmouth football team. Eastern originator who hit him so manfully that he was one of the best in the eastern sector of the country. Another year might well have carried him to All-American mention, at least.

Michkey Cochrane, catching ace of the team, played brilliant football at Boston university. Redman Hume, rookie outfielder, was one of the greatest football players ever produced in the south-west, and his play with the Southern Methodist won him All-American attention. Ossie Orwell, who

joined the Athletics a year ago as a pitcher and is slated to play first base this year, was quarterback at Lathrop college. Nick Borelli, infield hope, was selected as an All-American during his college career despite the fact that he played with Muhlenberg, outside the list of outstanding colleges in size and athletic prowess.

Miller Brown, another rookie, played end with Missouri university and was recognized as one of the great flankers turned out in the Big Missouri Valley. Max Bishop, second baseman, played football at City college in Baltimore. Homer Summa, outfielder obtained from Cleveland, was a grid star at Missouri U., and Scott, another young player, played with Mercer university.
