Section 18. It shall be unlawful for any person operating a taxicab to operate the same without first having for the transportation of passengers (and for the transportation of property) a license issued by the Village of Birmingham, Michigan, and such license shall be issued only upon the filing of a bond in the sum of \$100.00, which shall be in full of any and all damages which may be caused by the operation of such taxicab.
