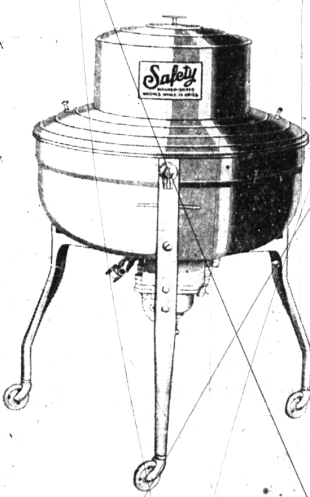
ADAMS FIVE CLOSE YEAR OF SUCCESS
