DEBATERS IN SIXTH WIN

Victory Over River Rouge Places Baldwin in Running For State Finals

The victory over the River Rouge affirmative debating team by Baldwin High School Friday night was the sixth consecutive victory this season. The local team is now one of 16 Michigan schools remaining in competition for the final honors.

Birmingham speakers in the order of their speeches in last Friday's debate were Patricia Chandler, Norma Martin, and Richard Fleming. The River Rouge affirmatives were: Mahal Thornton, Nedra Smith, and Ruth Eder.

The state question debate was resolved that a federal subsidy for the development of an American merchant marine is a wise national policy.

Principal Melvin Hart acted as chairman. The single critic judge system was used. Henry W. Blake, professor of speech at the Michigan State College, Lansing, returned the decision favoring the Birmingham speakers.

H. Earle Corvont, debating coach, said, "River Rouge is the best team we have met this year. Their speakers were notable for their ease and platform decorum. In this victory, we believe we have achieved considerable."

Baldwin debaters this year have equalled the record, so far set by the 1928 debating team, which defeated any Baldwin team in the past.

"Competition that the debaters have had to face this year has been harder than that of a year ago," Mr. Corvont stated.

The next debate scheduled is with the Milan negative team here on March 15.

The final debate which will decide the state championship will take place at Ann Arbor, April 26. To take part in the finals, Birmingham will have to win three more debates.

BALDWIN HIGH TO COMPLETE CAGE SEASON IN TOURNAMENT

Baldwin High Maroon quintet, playing at Adrian last Friday night, was defeated 24 to 23 in the final game of the season. With a lead of seven to one at the end of the first quarter, the Baldwin five slackened up and permitted Adrian to score seven field goals to go out in front at the half 15 to 10.

Starting the final period with the score 22 to 12, the Maroon and white aggregation led by Schwartz and Wedge popped in baskets from all points on the floor, making some pretty throws, but Birmingham was on the short end of the count when the final whistle blew.

Herman Schwartz was high scorer with nine points to his credit.

Birmingham played a fairly strong offensive game but lacked a well organized defense.

The Class B, C, and D District Tournament at St. Clair Thursday, Friday and Saturday will culminate the season. Birmingham is slated to meet their age rivals the St. Mary's squad from Orchard Lake in the opening game Thursday night. On Friday evening Grasse Point and Ferndale will play, and the finals on Saturday night will be between the winners of these two games. A trophy will be presented to the winner of the district tournament, and that team will participate in the Regional Tournament at the Detroit City College March 14, 15, and 16.

Although the Birmingham five are handicapped by some of the regulars being out of playing condition, Coach Ernest Engle expressed the opinion that his men have a good chance for honors.

Berger, who has been showing up well since the Ferndale game, suffered a sprained ankle in practice last week, and Ellerby too will be out of the game due to illness. The following men will make the trip to the Tournament: William Dixon instead of Berger at a forward position; Schwartz, forward; Ladd, center; Doherty and Wedge, guards. On the reserve line will probably be Rollins, Daily, Chanley, Deer, Harris, McCann, and McClelland.

The Baldwin quintet closes the season with a record of six games won and nine lost.

"We had a good start at the opening of the season, but things took a turn for the worst with the second semester," Coach Engle said yesterday. "Roderick Cox was lost through graduation, and the team has been handicapped by illness."

"Things point to a successful season for next year," Mr. Engle stated, "with several of the regulars coming back, and a number of experienced men available."
