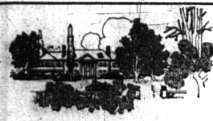

STATION OPENS NEXT WEEK

Super-Service Establishment Said To Be Largest In Country

Opening date for the new Birmingham super-service station and auto laundry at 360 south Woodward avenue is announced today for next Wednesday by Howard Ladue, owner.

Completion of the structure, delayed because of the rainy weather, is being rushed. The building contains many features designed to interest motorists.

The cost of the project totaled \$30,000, Mr. Ladue said. The land is occupied under a long term lease with the option of purchase.

"As far as I can determine it is the largest building of its kind in the country," Mr. Ladue said. "It has a frontage on Woodward avenue of 100 feet."

A rapid wash rack which will enable employes to clean cars in less than 15 minutes is one of the features. Mechanical departments are provided so service can be given.

Several stores will be operated in connection with the enterprise. Among them is a barber shop, lunch room and tire sales and service establishment. A large gasoline station is also connected with the business and a waiting room, furnished completely, is provided for persons whose cars are being washed or repaired.

Ralph G. Ferguson, former manager of the Bloomfield Hills service station, will be manager of the new station.

Mr. Ladue is part owner of a similar station in Detroit and plans to employ 22 persons here.

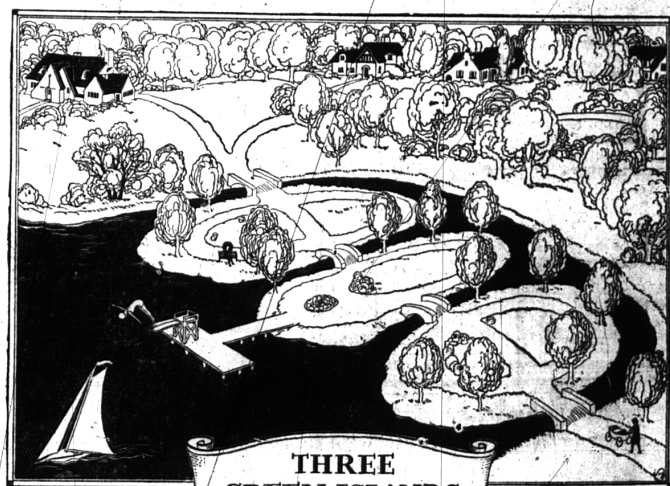
