

Badwin's 1929 Football Schedule Complete

NINE GAMES PLANNED FOR JOHNSON'S MEN

Mt. Clemens, Royal Oak Tilt Attract Fans' Attention

CONTROVERSY ARISES

Next fall's football schedule for Baldwin High School is completed today by Coach George Johnson. The two games that are drawing the most attention are Mt. Clemens here, Oct. 18, and Royal Oak, Thanksgiving Day. Nine games are arranged on the schedule and there remains one open date. Four of the games are to be played away while Barnum field will be

the battle ground for the other five.

Debate Mt. Clemens Game
While the status of the Mt. Clemens game remains unchanged today, pressure is being used to effect a cancellation on grounds that the game is being marked by the Mt. Clemens boys. Parents of at least one player on the Baldwin High School eleven have objected to the return match but whether action will be taken by school officials is not yet determined. Coach Johnson explained the teams are under contract and the game cannot be canceled because of Southern League rules.

Coach Johnson expects to put a heavier team on the field this year, and, as a result, overcome some of the handicaps faced by last year's eleven which went into every game outwitted.

Rainey and Berger, at ends, Morgan at guard and McDonald at tackle, will form the nucleus of the line. All are heavy, experienced players who will again wear the Maroon and White colors. Other veterans are Gore, Brien

Johnson Optimistic
Coach Johnson is optimistic over the prospects for the next season.
