Mr. Buck, The Driver, Is Introduced To Judge Buck, The Justice

E. H. Buck, of Outer drive, Detroit, was arrested Sunday by Patrolman Earl Walker who saw him driving while drunk on the Southfield road. He hailed him before his nameake, Justice Floyd S. Buck Monday morning.

Mr. Buck, Judge Buck, was driving blotto and—began Walker. The judge realized it was early in the morning and wondered whether Walker had not become confused. "What's your name?" the judge asked.

"Buck," was the chorus from the prisoner and patrolman. There seemed to be no doubt about it.

Mr. Buck told Justice Buck he (Mr. Buck, not Judge Buck) was guilty and Judge Buck fined Mr. Buck \$100 with the option of 60 days in jail. Mr. Buck told Judge Buck, whereupon Judge Buck ordered Mr. Buck's driver's license revoked for 30 days.

A companion of Mr. Buck's whose name did not happen to be Buck, Detroit, fared better. He paid a fine of \$35 for having been drunk.

**TEACHERS PAID \$310 FOR YEAR**

Rome, Italy has raised the pay of its school teachers as well as

teacher without dependents will receive about \$310 a year for the first few years of his professional life—10 months' service being exacted during the year. If the instructor has dependents he may receive as much as \$340 a year extra to fulfill his obligations. After five years he is entitled to an increase and during subsequent quinquennial periods he may gradually rise to the maximum annual salary of \$400 or \$430.

Of course if he qualifies by examination for an administrative post, his salary is higher. Likewise if he finds a place in the common schools of a city such as Rome or Milan his pay will be considerably higher. The rates quoted are for teachers in schools directly dependent upon the national government—a very large number in Italy.

The nation rigidly controls all education, but the larger communities have the right to employ their own teachers, subject to national supervision. School teachers enjoy reductions on railways, street cars and, in many cases, on house rent, but for other items in the family budget their expenses are no less than those of other members of the community.

The government finds it difficult to attract a sufficient number of men to the elementary teaching profession. Teaching has become a woman's vocation and women constitute the bulk of Italy's 100,000 teachers.

### DODGE ASSEMBLY TAKES ONE HOUR

Detroit.—How long is required for the final assembly of a motor car?

Despite the precision and care necessary in handling the various units along the two parallel assembly lines of Dodge Brothers, a chassis frame of the new six models is a complete car ready for shipment just one hour and 35 minutes after it starts down the line.

These assembly lines are 1,451 feet long, and have a capacity of one car every 36 seconds.

Behind this final assembly usually the most interesting place to visitors of an automobile factory—is a story of efficiency comparable to the system of getting food and munitions to the front line trenches in warfare. Every department must function so the parts continue to move forward without interruption. Costly delays would result if the final assembly line were held up for one part, so exacting time-table schedules are kept on all departments.

Hundreds of inspectors are made on all parts at their various quality and exactness are insured and they fit into the car just like units of a puzzle. The manufacture and assembly of the engine is completed with the dynamometer test just before it is carried by conveyors to the final assembly lines and dropped into the chassis.

A few steps further down the line, the exclusive Dodge Brothers Monopiece body joins the chassis by being lowered through an opening from the body department above, and in a few minutes the horizontal and vertical bolting of this body to the chassis is completed. From this point, the car assembly continues rapidly until every detail is finished and the car leaves the assembly line under its own power.

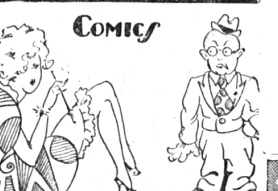
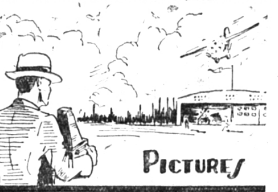
Once off the assembly line, every car is given a final inspection and then passes into the hands of the distribution department which routes the car by drive-aways or rail or boat shipment to dealers throughout the country.
