## INTERESTING FOLK DANCE PROGRAM IS GIVEN HERE

One of the most interesting dance programs to be staged in the village was that of the Folk Art society of Detroit, given at the Baldwin High School Saturday night under the sponsorship of the Woman's International League for Peace and Freedom.

More than 300 persons, prominent in Birmingham and Hills society, witnessed the program which featured dancers from foreign lands and folk songs presented by performers colorfully dressed in their national costumes.

Outstanding among the numbers on the program were the Ukrainian presentations. A selection by the Ukrainian orchestra, under the direction of Ivan Kus-towich, opened the ball. This was followed by a Ukrainian folk dance and song.

Probably the most famous of the Ukrainian features were the whip and sword dances. The solo whip dance with its colorful interpretation was met with hearty acclaim by the audience.

National songs and dances of Roumania, Slovakia, Russia and Sweden also appeared on the program, in each number the performers wearing the gay costumes of their native land.

As a fitting close to the cosmopolitan program members of the Henry Ford orchestra under the direction of J. Lovett supplied music for the American Square dances. The services of the Ford were donated by Mr. Ford, who had previously expressed his endorsement of the entire program.

The entire affair was arranged by Mrs. J. N. Hadjisky, Oakland County chairman of the Woman's International League for Peace and Freedom.
