STANLEY GETS SCOUT HONOR

Large Audience Attends Court of Honor in Birmingham

Before an audience of more than 200 persons, Lloyd L. Stanley was presented Friday with the first medal for achievements in animal husbandry awarded under the Detroit council of Boy Scouts and the only silver palm to go to a villager. The awards were made by Secretary Joseph Thompson of the Detroit Scout council followed by a talk on children and their activities.

The eagle scout badge, highest scout honor, was presented to Fred L. Johnson by his father, Fred W. Johnson, member of the Birmingham Scout council. This marks the eleventh village scout to receive such a distinction.

Announcement was made of the appointment of Penneck H. Wolston eagle scout, to the district scout council. He is also assistant scoutmaster of troop B 3.

A report was made of the new scout troop B 2 with the following announcements: Elmer Wiseman, scoutmaster; Leland Gunn, assistant scoutmaster; and Charles Buck, chairman.

The trophy for winning troop went to B 3, while B 4 won the attendance banner for the greatest number of parents in attendance at the court of honor. Richard Seager and Thomas Martindale were named first class scouts and 19 other boys received merit badges.

Rev. H. R. Porter of Leeds, Eng., left an estate valued at \$5, after preaching 30 years.

Representatives of the corporation have made several visits to Farmington and vicinity in the past week.

Completion of the work on installation of the dial system for Pontiac telephones is nearing completion, Thomas C. Maher, manager of the Pontiac branch of the Michigan Bell Telephone company announced.

Approximately 1500 children from the Royal Oak public schools romped and played their games together Friday in the second annual Play Day at Cass Field. The games were under the direction of Miss Marjorie Heath and proved a success. Eight grade schools in the city sent all their pupils from the third to the sixth grades inclusive to take part. Children in the first and second grades had their Play Day on the grounds of their respective schools. The spectacle at the Cass Field was striking and colorful. Besides athletic events there were many colorful folk dances. Police and school officials were being congratulated on their care of the children. Not one was injured or lost.

Police of Rochester are having a difficult time keeping transient peddlers from canvassing from house to house despite protests of Rochester merchants. Accord-

ing to the village ordinances, vendors' licenses, which may be obtained for a small yearly cost, entitle the holder to sell from house to house. They are issued to veterans of any United States war. The other licenses, however, sell for \$5 a day, a prohibitive price. Most of the vendors are managing to get a vet's license one way or another.

The art classes of the Rochester High School are doing their work in the outdoors this spring. Miss Aleese Fobler is the teacher.

Registration time for the school elections ended Saturday in Ferndale with only a small percentage of residents registered.

Funeral services were held for R. E. Bissell, formerly of Milford, who died in the Cleveland Clinic last week. Burial was in Leasing. He had gone to the clinic with Mrs. Bissell who was ill. She completed her examination and left the building while he was awaiting an examination for himself.

Henry Morgan, aged 14, of Wadsworth, Eng., was whipped by his father last summer when he came home with wet clothes. Now it has been found that he saved a chum from drowning at the time and he will receive a medal.

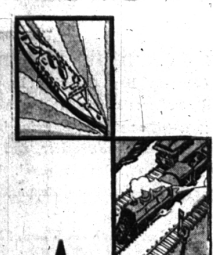
