Mr. and Mrs. Milton Coulson, of Madison avenue, are motoring to Hinsdale, Ill., this week end to attend the dog show.

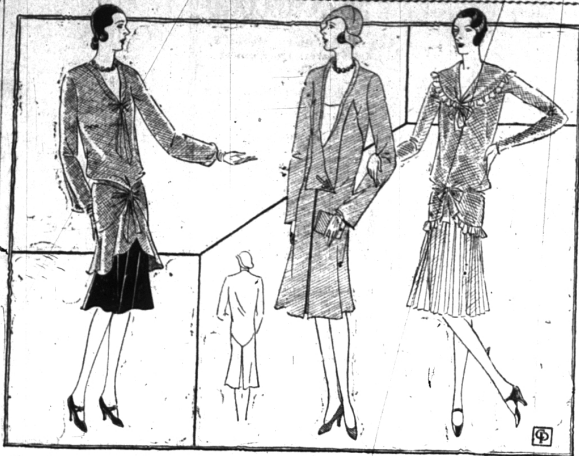

## Household Hints

  - French Toast with Crisp Bacon
  - Maple Syrup

The meat pie recipe is one that may be varied to suit individual tastes. I like onions cut up and cooked with the meat, and think that the meat should be cooked until it is very tender, so that it may be eaten with the fork. This may not appeal to others at all. I also like my pie quite highly seasoned. The amount is for four.

**Today's Recipes**  
Salad—The salad mentioned in the dinner is made of one spoon each cottage cheese, peas and grated carrot, all mixed, but placed separately on a lettuce leaf with a little dressing over it.

**Meat Pie**—Cut up remains of Sunday beef roast into remains of brown gravy adding more water, a teaspoon of butter and some salt. Cook a little, pour into baking dish. Then make baking powder biscuit dough, roll out to size of baking dish, make hole in center and place over top of meat. Press firmly around edge, bake until brown. Bake potatoes at same time.

**Peach Delight**—Cut one-inch slices from plain loaf cake, lay on small plates, spread with whipped cream and place half a peach (check side up) or some ripe strawberries around edge. Put a bit of whipped cream on top of each.

**What the Last of Its Kind**  
WHAT undoubtedly is one of the most unique of the many thousands of churches in all America is the Huguenot (French Protestant) church in Charleston, S. C.—said to be the only one of that faith still standing in this country.

The congregation of this church was organized soon after the arrival in South Carolina of the French refugees who departed from that country when the edict of Nantes was revoked in 1685. They constructed a church at the corner of Church and Queen streets in the city of Charleston about 1732, and at that time and succeeding structures have since held services on this identical spot.

During the centuries of its existence this church has retained its self-government and identity unchanged, despite the fact that its history has been a hectic one. Its records are known to have been lost in a fire in 1740 and again during the Civil war. In 1798, during the great fire, the church was blown up in an unsuccessful attempt to arrest the flames. In addition, it also has survived flood, invasion and an earthquake, but by the mercy of God and the earnest, faithful devotion of its founders it yet lives and speaks even though faintly. The present church was built in 1845.

History records that these French refugees were martyrs of conscience—a people of whom the welfare of all was the care of each.
