## ADAMS PRESENTS ANNUAL OPERA



## PORTEOUS, ROLLINS STAR AS BALDWIN SCORES IN STATE MEET

Baldwin high's trackmen, who qualified for the state meet, led by Coach Johnson journeyed to East Lansing Friday. They anchored fourth place two points behind Monroe and captured third. Niles nosed out Dearborn, last year's winner, for first place. Niles collected 27 points, Dearborn 22, Monroe 14, and Birmingham 12. Birmingham points were made by three men and a relay team, every man from Birmingham placed and Birmingham took seven medals. Milton Porteous proved himself a state champion by winning the 220 yard dash nosing out Shatt of Monroe and several others, with an eyelash finish. In the century, Porteous had bad luck and although he was with the leaders at the finish the judges failed to pick him for a place. Fred Rollins, running his second 440 in the century, was surprised by taking second with a brilliant finish. Porteous and Rollins are co-

captains of Baldwin's track squad this year and this was their last state meet. Douglas Berger, by vaulting 11 ft, secured a second place in the pole vault. The relay team with the aid of two fresh members, Harry York and Neal Welch, placed fourth making it the third straight year Birmingham could have gained a higher place by winning the relay.
