

300 GRADUATE FROM SCHOOLS

Rural Commencement Exercises To Be Held Saturday in Pontiac

Plans are completed today for the annual commencement exercises of Oakland County rural schools to be held Saturday at 10 p. m. in the Oakland Theater, Pontiac. Walter H. Pearce, state superintendent of public instruction, will give the principal address.

Approximately 300 students who have completed the eighth grade work in the rural schools of the county will attend the exercises and receive diplomas. In all about 275 diplomas will be issued, but a number of 10 month schools hold separate exercises.

Oakland County is fortunate in securing the state superintendent, according to E. J. Ledette, county school commissioner, who said, "Mr. Pearce has always been vitally interested in the rural schools and is devoting considerable time to their development and improvement."

More than 400 eighth grade students took examinations recently and their papers are now in the hands of the examining board. Special examinations for seventh and eighth grade pupils who were unable to be present at the scheduled time will be given in the office of the school commissioner in the Court House here on June 10 and 11.

A feature of the commencement exercises here June 11 will be by the Oxford High School band.

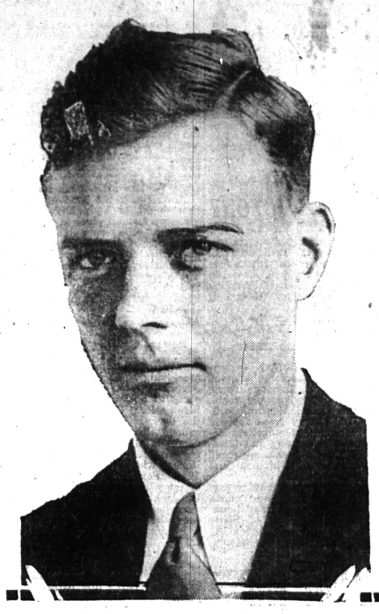

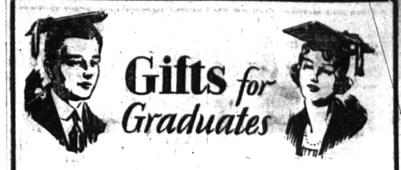

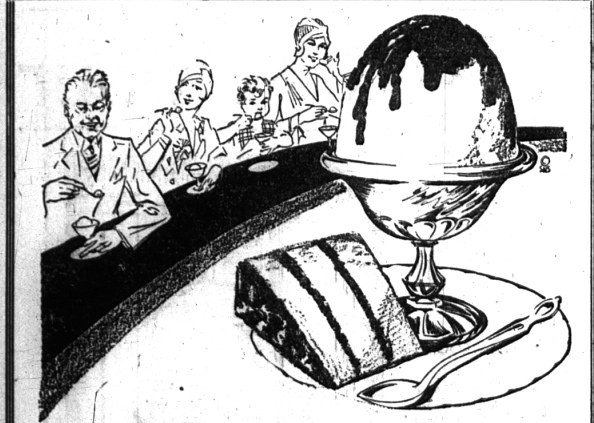
