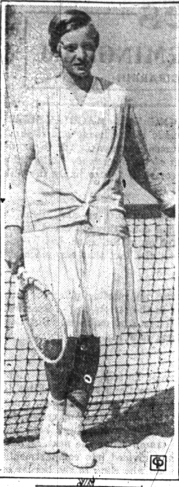

Today's Recipes

Spanish Ham Loaf—One pound uncooked ham (from chain end), two pounds lean pork, three-fourths cup milk, one-half green pepper minced, one-half small onion minced, one teaspoon minced parsley, two cups tomatoes, Grind meat. Add all ingredients but tomatoes. Mix thoroughly. Pack into greased baking dish. Pour over the tomatoes and bake in a moderate 350 degree oven for 1 1/2 hours. Unfold and serve on heated platter. Garnish with slices of hard-cooked eggs and shredded green pepper.

Strawberry Mousse—Dissolve a cup of powdered sugar in one cup of crushed strawberries, add two cups of cream, whip to firm. Mix well and add a little red coloring. Freeze in brick mould. When frozen cut and serve with whipped cream.

Suggestions

Care for Vacuum Cleaner
The vacuum cleaner requires a little attention once in a while. There are three things which you must do for your cleaner if you expect it to give you efficient and untroubled service:
First, keep the dirt bag emptied. A safe rule is to empty it out once a week, regularly. A dirt bag heavy with dirt cuts down the efficiency of your cleaner tremendously—about 35 per cent when the bag is one-fourth full.
Second, you must give the

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motor an occasional drink of oil unless your cleaner is of the ball-bearing type, which requires no oil. An uniled machine deteriorates and wears out quickly.
Third, wind the cord loosely back onto the hooks on the handle provided for it, or at least suspend it over a hook in the closet where the cleaner is stored, in such a position that the cord will not become knotted, pulled or stepped on. There are delicate wires inside the cord which will break if the cord is mistreated, putting your cleaner temporarily out of commission.
Use Coffee Cans
Save empty coffee cans for supplies, then paint and label them.
