GIRL SCOUTS LOOK TO SUMMER CAMP

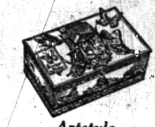
Many Villagers Going To Davis Lake For Vacation

BAPTISTS HOLD ANNUAL MEET

New Officers Elected By Church; Reports Given

Passing of a constitutional amendment providing for the election of a board of six deacons and a board of six trustees marked the annual meeting of the Baptist Church last week. Previously a board of 12 deacons was elected, the two boards being named from this group.

Leland J. Bunyan and James Allen and J. C. Irish, the latter to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Peter Anderson, were elected to the board of deacons. Anderson was named the only honorary deacon in the church.

Board of Assessors Ernest R. Breech was named to the board of trustees, while P. W. Parmenter was re-elected. The new board of deaconesses included Mrs. P. W. Parmenter and Mrs. Henry Stephens. The following officers were re-elected: Mrs. Leland J. Bunyan, clerk; Caleb G. Jackson, treasurer; David Anderson, Sunday school superintendent; and Alvin Curran, missionary treasurer.

Records showed 56 new members, 39 by baptism and 19 by letter added during the year. Of these 28 were received by baptism in the new church Easter Sunday. The Sunday school records show an enrollment of 200 children, 80 entering during the past six months.

A financial report showed that more than \$100,000 of the \$140,000 had been paid on the new building, the remainder being for the most part covered by pledges. The quota of \$2,000 to worldwide missions was paid in full. Women Get \$1,000 The fund for the furnishing of the new church, which is being raised by the women showed more than \$1,000. The year saw three new organizations as church activities, the most recent, the Boy Scout troop being organized last week under the direction of Elmer Wiseman, physical educational director at Adams School. The other organizations are the World Wide Guild for girls, and the Loyal Young People's Union.

In a message to the congregation Rev. David Leon Woodward, pastor, urged that the parish devote efforts to building the spiritual structure of the church now that the physical had been completed.
