

# VILET PRAISES RAY PALMER

## Work Of Candidate For Re-Election Lauded By School Superintendent

The following statement was issued today by Clarence Vilet, superintendent of Birmingham schools, in endorsing Ray A. Palmer, member of the board of education, who seeks re-election.

"Ray A. Palmer, who is a candidate for re-election to the board of education at the annual meeting June 10, 1929, was born near Plainwell, and graduated from the Plainwell high school. He taught district school for three years and then attended Kalamazoo College from which he graduated in 1904 with the degree of Ph. B. In 1905 he was graduated from the University of Chicago and became principal of the high school at Blairtown, Iowa, where he remained two years. He then came to Grand Rapids, and for 13 years was connected with the Central High School as session room supervisor and teacher of mathematics, during which time he took special work at Harvard University.

Rapids Teachers' club of 500 members for two years. He was a member of the East Grand Rapids council for seven years during which time extensive local improvements were made. During the war he had charge of the Boys Working Reserve for western Michigan.

"In 1919 he came to Highland Park, as business manager for the board of education. During the five and a half years of such service the additions to the Willard, Ferris and Ford schools were built. In 1923 he moved to Birmingham and in 1925 left the Highland Park schools and entered the real estate business in Birmingham. In July 1926 he was elected to the board of education and during his term the Quanton school has been built and he is an active worker for the proposed enlarged Barnum School. He has two children. His son, John, grad-

uated from the Baldwin High School last year and is now at Oberlin.

"Mr. Palmer is a firm believer in the future of Birmingham and adequate school facilities for each child under the direction of well qualified teachers. His wide experience as a teacher, and administrator, and executive and a business man particularly qualify him for intelligent helpful service on the board of education. He is a faithful attendant of the meetings of the Birmingham Rotary, and has missed but two out of the 21 meetings since July 1, 1928. His candidacy should command thoughtful attention and support of the voters who desire real local service from candidates for positions on the board of education.

First: Resolution  
Improvement of Lone Pine Road, Woodward Ave. to Redford Road.  
Moved by Commissioner Whitely, supported by Commissioner Robson, that the following preamble and resolution be adopted:

Whereas this Commission, by virtue of a resolution passed May 13th, 1928, determined that it is expedient and advisable that the Lone Pine Road, from its junction at Laker Rd., be improved and widened to a width of 40 feet, and whereas the construction of concrete curbs and gutters, a set of compacted gravel and Village of Bloomfield Hills and more particularly described as follows:

Beginning at the west line of Woodward Ave. and extending westerly 2184 ft. to the east line of Redford Road, thence easterly 2184 ft. to the east line of Woodward Ave. and extending easterly 2184 ft. to the east line of Redford Road, a total of 8552 ft. from station 13850 to 12532 in front of the Cranbrook

Be it further resolved that this Commission shall meet at the Village Clerk's office in the Village of Bloomfield Hills on May 13, 1929, at 8 o'clock p. m. to hear all objections to the proposed improvement, and the method of assessment thereon.

Whereas by virtue of the same resolution the Village Engineer has prepared a plan of construction of such above named improvement, and the same, with the cost of the same amounting to a total of \$14,000;

Now be it resolved that all lots and all above named road and in the north by a line parallel to and 1000 ft. N. of the center line of Lone Pine Road, on the east by the W. line of Woodward Ave., on the south by a line parallel to and 1100 ft. S. of the center line of Lone Pine Road, will be benefited by said improvement, and shall constitute a Special Assessment District upon which a special assessment shall be levied to defray a substantial expense of construction of such above named improvement, and

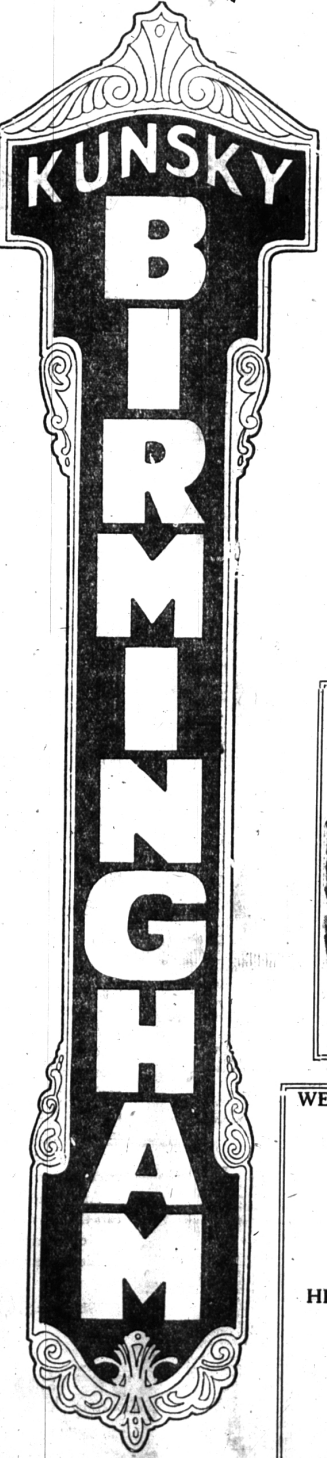
