

SCHOOLS PLAN OPEN HOUSE

Spring Seasons To Take Place Of Education Week Observance

Birmingham schools are not participants in the National Education Week which is being held throughout the country, Nov. 11 to 15. Open house, to be held at all Birmingham schools late in the spring, will replace this National Education Week observance, according to Clarence Vliet, superintendent of schools.

From Nov. 5 to 11 last year Birmingham joined in observance of the week. "We found that the spring open house at the schools aroused far more interest, however," Mr. Vliet said. Records show nearly 3,000 persons in attendance at the open house.

Second, the purchase of a warehouse and garage on the site is badly needed for safeguarding and distribution of supplies and for the shelter of machinery and equipment from the elements. I sincerely hope both of these measures will be approved.

I am opposed to any appreciable increase in taxes, and believe we should lead every effort to a sound, sensible and economical administration of village affairs.

We are purely residential community and should maintain that wholesome condition as long as possible. This is badly needed real residential suburbs out of Detroit: Birmingham and Grosse Pointe, and Birmingham, with wider Woodward and the proposed fast interurban train service, will easily excel all others in development.

I am willing to predict that the territory lying along the rapid transit lines will, in a reasonable length of time, become the most densely populated district within the 25 mile circle.

As a whole, Birmingham stands up well with any other community in the State, and I am sure your present village commission is ready to meet squarely and fairly any and all issues that arise that effect the welfare and good of this fair village of ours.

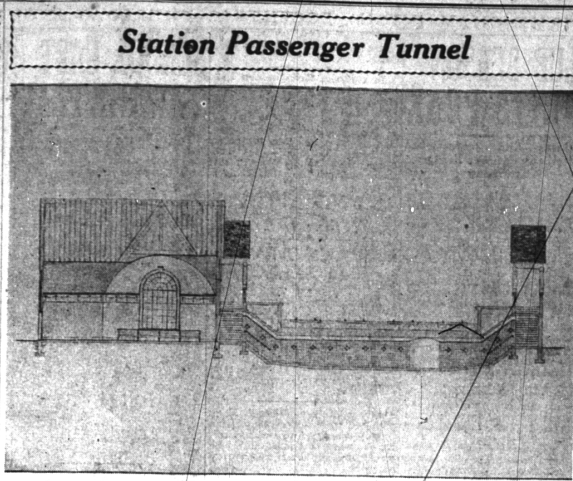

With his wife and family he will make his home at 644 Purdy street.



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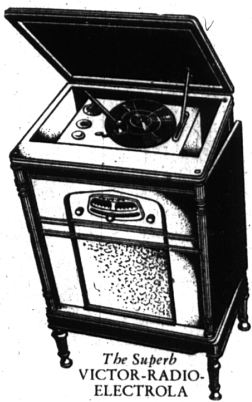

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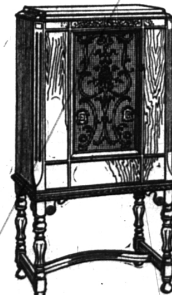
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
