

Baldwin Debaters Open Season Today

ROYAL OAK IS HERE FOR FIRST TILT

Three Girls Represent Birmingham In Initial Debate

JUDGE SYSTEM TOPIC

A heated contest is promised when Baldwin's debating team meets Royal Oak's team at 3 p. m. today at the senior session room of the Birmingham High School for the first preliminary tilt debate of the Michigan High School Debating League.

Birmingham will uphold the affirmative of the resolution that a judge or system of judges be used in the state courts of Michigan without the jury, while the scores debaters will take the negative side.

According to H. Earle Corvont, public speaking coach, the debate promises to be one of the most hard fought matches this year. Baldwin's team will enter this year. Royal Oak's team last year was runner up for the state championship and winner of the Michigan contest the year previous, while the Baldwin debaters were among

the eight remaining teams in the elimination series. This year over 200 high schools in the state entered in the contest. After the four preliminary debates the 64 high schools having the best records are chosen to debate in the elimination series.

Birmingham's team boasts an entirely new personnel with Peggy Hart, Mary Hutchinson and Geraldine Kessler representing the Baldwinians.

Donald Soules, Russell Haselton and Margaret Patterson comprise the Royal Oak trio. Miss Ruth Huston Whipple, debate coach of Northwestern High School, Detroit, will act as judge for the event. The chairman of the event will be Arthur Stratton, history instructor at the Baldwin High School.

The argument will last 10 minutes with a five minute rebuttal.
