

# TIPTSY DRIVERS FACE COURT

### Fines, Jail Sentences Meted Out To Drunk Motorists

Two men have paid fines here today and are released on drunk driving charges. They are Leo McCarthy, of Pontiac, and Timothy Scannell, of Detroit.

McCarthy, arrested by Patrolman Robert Appell in Woodward avenue Saturday night paid a fine of \$100 in Justice Floyd S. Buck's court. Scannell was arrested by Patrolmen Leslie Trueblood and Earl Moody. He was fined \$50 by Justice Malcolm Hunt.

Jack McDermott, of Columbia, was fined \$35 by Justice Buck on a disorderly charge. Patrolman Trueblood made the arrest. Similar charges were placed against Lewis Ryder, colored, 7 Auburn avenue, Pontiac, and his companion, Dorsey Allen, colored, 62 Orchard Lake avenue, Pontiac. Ryder, driver of the machine, paid a \$75 fine, and his companion paid \$25. They were arrested by Sgt. Delos Anderson, of the Hills police, Sunday, and appeared before Justice Buck Monday.

A lonely spree cost Robert Palmer, 138 Pleasant street, Detroit, \$20 in Justice Buck's court. He was also arrested Sunday by Sergeant Anderson.

A fine of \$75 was paid by Walter Mulqueen, 1722 Military avenue, Detroit, driver of a machine, arrested by Sgt. Anderson on a disorderly count. His companion, Ray Bastien, 12844 Hayden avenue, Detroit, is serving a 29 day jail sentence on the same charge. The sentences were handed out by Justice Buck.

Charged with drunk driving when he attempted to crash into the Hills police scout car as it overtook him, Homer Groves, 1205 Lucas street, Toledo, today is serving a 60 day sentence in Oakland County jail. Louis Bronkie, 1237 Lucas street, also of Toledo, a passenger in the car Monday began his 20 day jail term. They were given alternatives of 60 and 20 days respectively by Justice Buck.

Speeding charges cost two men \$15 Tuesday in Justice Buck's court. They were: F. T. Bower, 930 Woodcrest avenue, Royal Oak, and Clarence Richardson, 102 Mechanic street, Pontiac. The arrests were made by Officers James Anderson and Appell respectively.

The plan is now being studied by both the village and planning commissions.

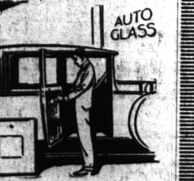

## Ohio Youth Raises Much Of State's Turkey Supply For Thanksgiving Tables

New Lexington, O.—Arthur Metzger, 24-year-old Junction City youth, will furnish much of the turkey supply for the festive tables of central Ohio at Thanksgiving this year.

In 1925 young Metzger was graduated from school. He turned from his books much as many other young men of today do for a living.

Arthur's mother, Mrs. John Metzger, had been in the habit of raising a half dozen turkeys from different hatcheries throughout

the country. Today he has a flock of 1,100 of his turkeys that would make any big produce dealer sit up all night to bid on. Metzger has 600 gobblers that will average 20 pounds each, and 500 hens that will tip the scales at 12 1/2 pounds each. Metzger has approximately

\$10,000 worth of turkeys on his little farm, which is located one mile south of Junction City. A heavy armed guard is maintained day and night as a precaution against marauding poultry thieves. This young man's idea will net him this year as much profit as the average 500-acre farm in any section of this county.
