GOOD FUTURE FOR DEBATERS

Baldwin High School Team Looks To Brilliant Season

Following their defeat here Thursday of the Royal Oak High School in the preliminary tilt of the Michigan High School Debating League, Baldwinians today face an even more brilliant season than last year which found them among the eight remaining teams in the elimination series.

The Oakers were considered the Baldwinians' most formidable opponents being last year's runners-up for the state championship and

first in the 1927 Michigan contest. "The Baldwin-Royal Oak tilt was one of the best debates ever held at the first preliminary," H. Earle Correvont, public speaking coach, declared. It was a hard fought match and marks an important victory for the Birmingham debaters.

A Well-Balanced Team
According to Mrs. Ruth Huston-Whipple, debate coach of Northwestern High School, judge of the event, the Baldwinians boast a well rounded and balanced team. She named Miss Margaret Patterson, of Royal Oak, as the outstanding debater of the tilt, however.

The villagers upheld the affirmative of the resolution that a judge or system of judges be used in the state courts of Michigan without the jury. Royal Oak supported the negative.

Peggy Hart, Mary Hutchinson and Geraldine Kessler comprise Baldwin's team. This marks the first debating season for each of the trio.

The acorn squad boasts two veteran debaters, however, with Donald Soules, Russell Hazelton and Margaret Patterson completing the personnel.

Arthur Stratton, Baldwin high school instructor, acted as chairman.

On Dec. 5 the Baldwinians will meet the Fordon debaters here according to plans being completed today. This will be Baldwin's second preliminary debate. After four preliminaries 64 best teams from the 200 high schools entered will debate in the elimination series.

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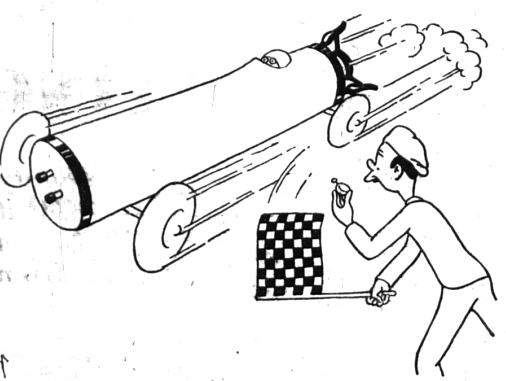
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SENIOR SHOW IS POSTPONED

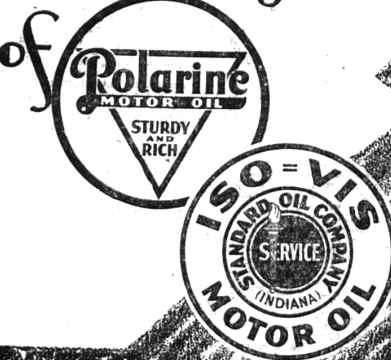
