

# SCOUTS GIVEN HIGH HONORS

Crull, Wollaston And Mills Receive Palms From Group

Two young members of Birmingham boy scout troops and one leader were honored Friday night at the Fall Court of Honor held in the Baldwin Library.

Howard D. Crull leader of Troop 3, was given a silver palm, Pennek Wollaston a gold palm and Diamond Mills, a bronze medal.

The awards were made by Col. Edwin S. George, speaker of the evening. Col. George stressed the value of giving, saying he presented the camp site on the Long Lake road, now used by the Birmingham boys, for the pleasure of giving boys. He declared if they improve the site he will aid them further in the future.

The Rev. William H. Aulen, pastor, assistant rector of Christ Church, Cranbrook, spoke on the value of choice, urging the boys to place the proper emphasis on values and selections.

Parents of the scouts packed the library auditorium. Troop 3-B had a 94 per cent parent attend-

ance and recaptured the banner they lost last May to Troop 3-B. The awards were made by Dr. H. H. Rhoem and Lawrence Clark, members of the court of honor and Charles Kinnison, a member of the Scout Council. Shelton Wright, chairman of the Court of Honor, presided throughout the evening.

Colonel Edwin S. George, donor of the Birmingham Boy Scout camp site on the east Long Lake road, is honored by the scouts today who have named their new recreation grounds, "Camp George" after him. The selection was made by the boys, who took an overnight hike to the camp Saturday and Sunday.
