### Tuberculosis Society Opens \$260,000 Campaign On Thanksgiving Day

Lansing, Mich., Nov. 18.—Thanksgiving Day will mark the official opening of the Christmas seal sale in Oakland county when 5,000,000 of the health stickers will be mailed to residents of the county, according to an announcement of the Michigan Tuberculosis Association.

Heartened by the returns from the 1928 sale, which for the first time saw the \$250,000 mark reached in Michigan, officials of the state and local groups in charge of the campaign have set as their 1929 goal the sum of \$260,000, or an amount larger by 4 per cent than was subscribed last year.

Explaining the reason for the increased quota, F. E. Mills, president of the Michigan tuberculosis association, states that "further reductions in the tuberculosis death rate will be brought about only through greatly increased effort and expense. The time of large decreases at comparatively small cost has passed.

## IN THE WORLD OF SPORTS

Even Mr. Hoover, The President, Seems Unable To Bring Army And Navy Football Teams Together Again

**THE Army and Navy football game, which used to be known as the country's greatest grid spectacle, is not likely to be renewed this season. It would seem, despite the request by President Hoover that the two government institutions settle their differences, patch up all difficulties, get out on the football field and play the game.**

Mr. Hoover, besides being president of the United States also carries the title of commander-in-chief of the Army and Navy forces, but his policy suggestion fell on deaf ears. So what can the ordinary football fan do about it? Of course, Mr. Hoover might order them to get together and forget their grievances—which certainly would leave a bad taste in the mouths of the two institutions.

Dartmouth, one of the nation's outstanding teams, is slated to meet the Navy in Philadelphia Nov. 30 but the Navy team has declared its willingness to step aside in favor of the Army, should the Army elect to play. The Army eleven is scheduled to clash with Notre Dame on that date at New York. Dartmouth heads suggest that they be allowed to keep the appointment with the Rambling Irish, if the Army and Navy eleven and the Navy team, the 1928 eleven would be wrecked.

"Without Cagle, Murrell, Perry, Humber and the others in the lineup an Army-Navy contest this fall would be a farce. It's doubtful if the Navy would relish a victory over an Army team in such deplorable condition.

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The Carnegie Foundation's report fits collegiate athletics declared the Army's hands were clean of profiting and subsidizing athletes, while the same could not be said of the Navy. In both instances, however, the Cadet or Middy is paid wages, furnished room, board and clothes, whether or not he is an athlete. Army believes in "athletics for all," regardless of their age or playing experience. Navy upholds the rules of other universities and colleges by limiting the athletes to three years of major competition.

Philadelphia was to have been the scene of the 1927 Army-Navy struggle but difficulties arose to cancel relations. Consequently Philadelphia and Pennsylvania at large is keenly interested in resumption, or proposed resumption of service school athletic relations.

Future Army-Navy games it is said, will be played only in Washington, D. C. in a mammoth stadium to be constructed. Don't count on that too heavily, though, for Army heads show no signs of weakening and the Navy executives declare they'll stick up for their rights.

**ORDINANCE NO. 159**  
AN ORDINANCE AMENDING PART I, ARTICLE VIII, SECTION 2, OF ORDINANCE NO. 104 OF THE CITY OF BIRMINGHAM, ENTITLED "AN ORDINANCE OF SETTING UP A BUILDING CODE OF THE VILLAGE OF BIRMINGHAM," AND REGULATING THE CONSTRUCTION OF BUILDINGS IN THE VILLAGE OF BIRMINGHAM.

The Village of Birmingham ordains: That Part I, Article VIII, Section 2 of Ordinance No. 104 be and is hereby amended by the addition of Paragraph (k), which reads as follows:

(k) In the construction of reinforced concrete structures, the specifications set forth in the Joint Standard Building Code together with all amendments thereto, shall be adopted by the American Institute of Architects as permitted as a basis of design. Such construction shall conform to the water-cement ratio and such tests as are specified in the Joint Standard Building Code. The cost of all tests shall be paid by the owner of the structure.

Made and passed by the Commission of the Village of Birmingham this 18th day of Nov. A. D. 1929.
