**Store Presents Rental Paradox**

"Paradoxical as it may sound, Birmingham has a new store, which, while paying one of the largest rentals in Michigan, is probably, one of the smallest for a downtown Birmingham location," said Mr. E. H. Tilton, of the real estate firm of Colgrove, Buck & Tilton.

"The location is the new Twin Hosiery Shop in the Woodward avenue side of the First State Bank Bldg.

"This small store, is paying approximately ten dollars per square foot for its space while the average rent for the rest of the block is probably between \$2.25 and \$2.50 a square foot. Few downtown Detroit tenants, pay any thing like this amount."

"On the other hand, the gross amount of rent paid in actual cash makes it the cheapest location in the heart of business Birmingham.

**School District Question Fixed**

A settlement is effected today between the Birmingham and Royal Oak school districts relative to the one-room Maplecrest school. An election of 1927 defining the Royal Oak school district coterminous with the city district made the school Royal Oak property.

According to the terms of the settlement Royal Oak is to pay Birmingham a total of \$22,927.76. Already \$6,931.82 has been paid in cash in addition to this sum. The remainder is to be paid in amounts of \$881.83 semi annually with the interest on the balance at 4.669 per cent.

George A. Dendero, attorney represented Royal Oak in the matter while Birmingham was represented by Orville H. Foster, Jr.

Until this semester Birmingham has operated the school, which averaged 20 pupils. One teacher was employed. Since September Royal Oak has been transporting the students by bus to the Starr school.

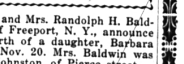
**Baptists Offer Thanks Service**
