

PAEGANT HELD AT CRANBROOK

Silver Anniversary Of Booth Family's Advent Is Celebrated

A pageant marking the silver anniversary of Mr. and Mrs. George G. Booth's coming to Cranbrook was celebrated Sunday at the Christ Church in place of the regular vesper service. Historic events of the Bloomfield and Birmingham region marked the pageant which was staged by various units of the Cranbrook Foundation.

Musical numbers and tableaux were presented by groups from the Cranbrook School for Boys, Arts and Crafts School, Bloomfield Hills School and Christ Church. The occasion also marked the "Founder's Day" at the institutions of G. Wombacher of the English Department of the Cranbrook School for Boys, composed the music and wrote the words for the historical presentation.

The pageant was directed by Harry S. Booth and Warren C. Moore. Vernon B. Kellett, professor of music at Cranbrook, also played an important part in the ceremonies.

MULES INCREASING—SAVE THOSE ODES
