LATIN PLAY GIVEN PRAISE

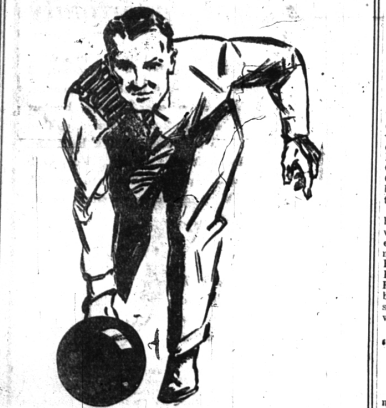
