Miss Lamborn To Direct Radio Programs For Piano Company

Miss Betty Jane Lamborn, of Worth street is today director of radio activities for the Baldwin piano company, Detroit, thought to be the first person to hold such a post with a commercial company.

She recently resigned her position as program director of the WCHP broadcasting station in the Macaboe building, Detroit, a post which she has held for three years. Miss Lamborn was believed to be the youngest woman program director in the country.

Miss Lamborn's efforts will be centered upon the formation of the Baldwin Junior Artists club for music students up to 17 years of age. This club is being organized to encourage young musicians.
