Progress made by the automotive industry and its allied rubber industry in the past few years is noted in the announcement that the Goodyear Tire & Rubber company has made its 150,000,000th tire. The record established by Goodyear stands out alone in the rubber industry, it is claimed.

Goodyear reached the 100,000,000 mark in April of 1927. Twenty-four years were required to establish that record in comparison showing 50,000,000 or half as much added to the total in the space of two years and four months.

**NOTICE OF A SPECIAL ASSESSMENT**

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that a meeting of the Township Board of the Township of Southfield, Oakland County, Michigan, will be held on Tuesday, the 15th day of October, A. D. 1929, at 8 o'clock P. M., in the Township Office, in the Southfield School, corner Ten Mile Road and Here Road, Southfield, Michigan, for the purpose of considering any objections to the installation of water mains in the territory of said Township of Southfield described in the annexed resolution, in said Township, and also for the purpose of considering any objections to the making of a special assessment to defray the cost and expense of the installation of said water mains, all as more fully set forth in a resolution of the Township Board of the Township of Southfield duly adopted at a meeting thereof held September 24th, 1929, of which the following is a true copy:

"WHEREAS, a petition has been filed with the Township Board of the Township of Southfield, Oakland County, Michigan, verified both as to signature and ownership by more than sixty-five per cent of the owners of the property of the plat of lands to be made into a special assessment district for the purpose of paying the costs of the installation and extension of water mains, and praying that the Township Board install and extend water mains to provide water for fire protection and domestic use in the plat of lands so described, and agreeing that the costs of said improvement shall be paid by special assessment to be levied upon the lands containing a special assessment district, and

"WHEREAS, the Township Board has caused to be made estimates of the cost and expense of said improvement, and has caused to be made and filed a map and diagram of the work and the location of the proposed water mains, which show the boundaries and division of all the lots and parcels of land in the district to be benefited, and also the location of said water mains, and the grade and dimensions thereof, all of which are now on file at the office of the Township Clerk, for public examination;

"NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that it is hereby determined by the Township Board of the Township of Southfield to make the said improvement of installing water mains in accordance with the maps and diagrams so made and filed, and to make an assessment to be levied upon the lands and as by statute in such case made and provided;

"RESOLVED FURTHER, that said Township Board has estimated and determined that the expense of installing said water mains will be approximately seventeen thousand (\$17,000.00) Dollars, which amount shall be defrayed by special assessment, according to the benefits to be derived from the said improvement;

"RESOLVED FURTHER, that it is the intention of the Township Board that the premises hereafter described will be benefited by said improvement and it is the intention of the Township Board to assess the same for the purpose of defraying the cost of said improvement as estimated and provided;

"RESOLVED FURTHER, that the Township Board of the Township of Southfield do hereby certify that the said improvement of installing water mains in accordance with the maps and diagrams so made and filed, and to make an assessment to be levied upon the lands and as by statute in such case made and provided, and that notice of said meeting be given by posting notices thereof at least two weeks preceding the time of said meeting in three public places in the Township of Southfield, and there being no newspaper published in the Township of Southfield, a legal publication cannot be had, a newspaper notice, however, shall be published in two issues of the Township of Southfield, Michigan;

"RESOLVED FURTHER, that the department of the Township Clerk, included in the special assessment district is as follows, to-wit: Lots numbered 1 to 26, both inclusive, being a subdivision of the N. W. 1/4 of the S. W. 1/4 of Section 25, T. 1 N., R. 16 E., Southfield Township, Oakland County, Michigan;

which resolution was proposed by Clark and supported by Bilkowsky.

A vote being taken on said resolution, it was voted as follows:
