

Glenna Collett Retains Golf Title

ESTABLISHES RECORD MARK IN VICTORY

Mrs. Presler Hangs On Tenaciously Till Last, But Glenna Is Better

DECIDED ON GREENS

Breaking all precedent in American golf history Miss Glenna Collett, of Los Angeles, today retains the woman's national golf crown for the fourth successive year.

With a better score than any other woman has ever made in the woman's National Golf tournament in a match played over a difficult course Saturday, Miss Collett won her final victory by downing Mrs. Leona Presler, of San Gabriel, Cal., 4 and 3, in the 36-hole final at Oakland Hills Country club.

Although Mrs. Presler played golf good enough to trounce any other woman in the country she could not down Miss Collett who was 12 under women's par for the 36 holes. At the three of the match Mrs. Presler was eight under par.

Before Saturday five women had held the title three times. Twice Miss Collett had tried to hold her crown for two successive years, but both times she was beaten early in the tournament.

The championship was decided on the greens. Mrs. Presler held her own with the long-driving champion. She played her second shots well, but on the greens Miss Collett displayed a better putting touch and better judgment of distance and roll.

On 10 greens Miss Collett holed putts from four to 20 feet. On five greens Mrs. Presler missed putts of three feet or less. Five times Mrs. Presler needed three putts—Miss Collett three-putted only three.

Miss Collett started her fine putting on the first hole of the match, sinking her first putt, while Mrs. Presler missed hers to lose the hole. On the fourth Miss Collett holed a five-foot putt to win. On the seventh she duplicated this putt to win.

She won the ninth with a six-foot putt for a half. She held Mrs. Presler even on the sixteenth with a 40-foot putt. On the morning round one up when she dropped another six-foot putt on the eighteenth green to win the hole.

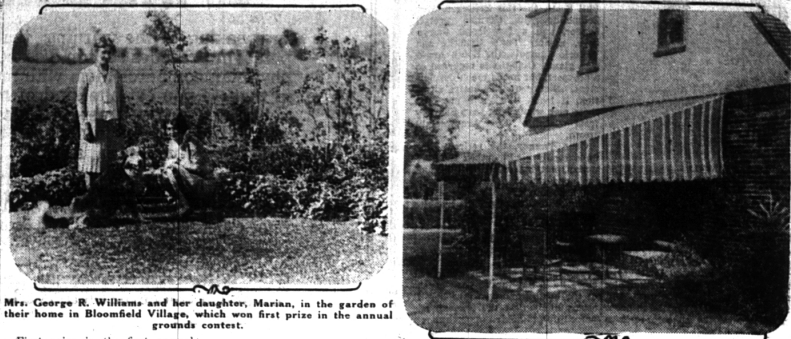
Takes Lead Again
She took the lead again on the twenty-first green when she sank an eight-footer for a birdie two. Miss Collett won the twenty-fourth with a birdie three through sinking a 12-foot putt. She halved the twenty-fifth with an eight-footer. A 20-foot downhill putt that dropped won her the twenty-ninth and she ended the match with a sensational birdie three.

On the last hole, the officials had to use a measure to determine which ball was farther from the cup. Miss Collett's was 29 feet 1 1/2 inches (official U. S. G. A. measurement) from the hole. She putted and holed it, conceding Mrs. Presler one that was six inches shorter.

Miss Collett never was down. As late as the twentieth hole Mrs. Presler was even. Miss Collett won six of the last 13 holes and lost two. The champion started with a pair of birdie fours and won both holes. She halved the next two. Mrs. Presler's first winning hole was the fifth, one of the four holes where Miss Collett was above par. She won the seventh and reached the turn leading two up. Although she took a six on the tenth, she gained a half when Mrs. Presler took three on the par four.

Three putts won Mrs. Presler the twenty-second and made Miss Collett two up. They halved the twenty-third and a 12-foot putt that was in all the way won the twenty-fourth for Miss Collett.

running her lead to three up. A birdie three for Mrs. Presler reduced this to two up on the twenty-fifth but the title holder was four-up at the afternoon turn when she won both the twenty-sixth and twenty-seventh with birdies.

The last hole Mrs. Presler won was the twenty-eighth. Miss Collett took four to reach the green and Mrs. Presler was down in four for a birdie. Miss Collett came back with a birdie three on the twenty-ninth again to become four up. Each scored five on the thirtieth where Miss Collett pulled out with one putt after dubbing her second shot not more than 50 yards. Mrs. Presler three-putted the thirty-first, giving Miss Collett a half in fours. Each took five on the thirty-second and then Miss Collett ended the match with her sensational putt on the thirty-third green.

Miss Collett qualified Monday with a score of 82, being one of seven with that total. Mrs. Presler had the same qualifying score. In turn she defeated Mrs. W. A. Johnson, of Philadelphia, 6 and 5; Miss Maureen Orcott, Englewood, N. J., 7 and 5; Mrs. Harley G. Higbie of Detroit, 1 up, 19 holes (in one of the most sensational matches of the tournament, Miss Collett winning after being four down with four holes to play) and

Mrs. Opal S. Hill, Kansas City, 3 and 2.

Mrs. Presler defeated her leading California rival, Mrs. Gregg Lifer, Los Angeles, 2 up in her first match. Then she eliminated Miss Marion Turpie, New Orleans, 4 and 2; Mrs. Dorothy Campbell Hurd, Philadelphia, 3 and 1; and Miss Bernice Wall of Oshkosh, 3 and 2.
