HAMILTON AVE. WIDENING

611—Resolved, That the following preamble and resolution be adopted:

Whereas Oct. 17, 1929, was heretofore and is hereby designated as the day for the meeting to hear suggestions and objections to the widening of the right of way on Hamilton Avenue from Woodward Avenue to the present Grand Trunk right of way to 60 feet, and the pavement now constructed for 22 feet to 40 feet between curbs, in the Village of Birmingham, and

Whereas due notice of the meeting has been given in the manner required by law to each person owning property liable for special assessment within a special assessment district established for such purpose, and the Commission duly met on this 17th day of Oct., A. D. 1929, at 8 o'clock P. M. for the purpose aforesaid, and due notice has been given to all persons making suggestions and objections to the proposed improvement, therefore
