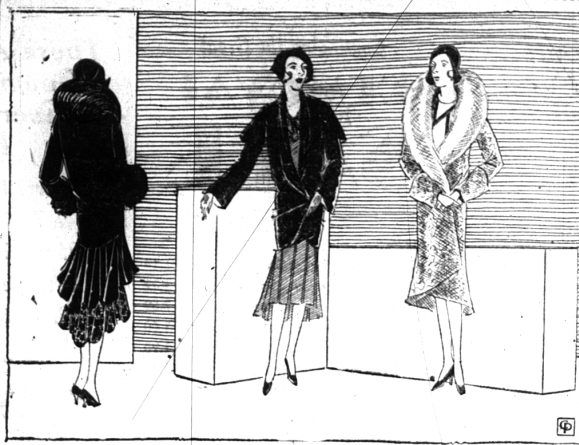

COAT LENGTHS RISE AS SKIRTS DROP

While we are intrigued watching the skirt lengths go down, it is quite as intriguing to note that coat lengths are going up. This is the natural outcome of cause and effect. As mentioned before in these articles, the lengthened skirt is responsible for the change in silhouette, and the shortened coat length is not an illusion

created by the lengthened skirt, leaving the coat where it was before, but making it appear much shorter. It is an actual subtraction from the coat length as a solution of what to do about the long, irregular skirtline now in vogue for daytime wear.

Not that the long coat is out of fashion. The shorter coats have scarcely arrived as yet, except in jacket-form and for evening wear, but many of the smart women seen at the Ritz and other smart places in New York have adopted the shorter coat for wear with the dipped in the back and other irregular skirtlines.

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the fashion for white evening gown under wraps of some rich shade of velvet, deep violet, for instance.

In the full length coats many of the morning models remain straightline and are belted. In none of the coats is the princess line over-emphasized, though its influence is strongly felt. The flare on afternoon coats is placed low in full length models, and they occasionally carry the dip in the back.

The sketch illustrates the three types of coats. The first is in the silhouette of the three-quarter afternoon coat worn with the irregular hemline. The second is a jacket of fur by Chanel, with little-rippling caps over the shoulders and the third is a favorite model for the full length coat, also developed in fur. This last is of brown caracul in a wrap-around model, showing the princess influence, and slightly longer at the back and sides. The high standing collar is of blue fox, while the deep cuffs are of the caracul.

Today's Recipes
Pressed Veal—One medium-sized veal shank, one hard-boiled egg, six olives, stuffed, one-eighth teaspoon pepper, one and one-half teaspoons salt. Cook shank until very tender. Remove from broth and pick from bone. Grind meat, egg and olives, mix with seasoning. Place in a mold, do not pack tight. Reheat broth, strain and pour slowly over meat until just covered. Set away for about 12 hours to harden. Slice when ready to serve.

Chops With Pineapple—Put chops in greased pan on top of stove and broil. When done, remove to hot platter. Dip slices of pineapple in flour and brown in same pan. Serve chops with pineapple rings surrounding.

Pepper Relish—One dozen green peppers, one dozen red peppers. Remove seeds, grind or chop fine and cover with boiling water. Chop one dozen onions, drain peppers and put in kettle with onions, one pound brown sugar, one pint vinegar, salt to taste. Boil one hour, seal in jars or glasses.

New Luncheon Dish
EGG AND CORN SCALLOP
(Mrs. Mary Horton's Weekly Tested Recipe)
Cut eight hard-cooked eggs in half, lengthwise, and mash the yolks. Sauté one-half cup of chopped mushrooms in two tablespoons of butter until tender and add to the yolks. Add one teaspoon of salt, one-eighth teaspoon of pepper, one-eighth teaspoon prepared mustard and two tablespoons of cream, and re-fill the whites with the mixture. Place in a shallow buttered baking dish. Add one-fourth cup of cream and pepper and salt to taste to a can of corn and pour it around the eggs; cover with buttered crumbs and brown in a hot oven.
