GRID TEAM LOSES GAME IN LAST FRAME

River Rouge Aggregation Gathers 19 Points, Holds Villagers Blank

The Birmingham High football team bowed for the first time this season in a 19-0 defeat to River Rouge last Saturday afternoon on Howe field, River Rouge. The loss came as an atonement for Birmingham's victory over River Rouge last year.

The Baldwin gridgers will clash with Mt. Clemens next Friday at the home field in a much controverted game.

A drizzling morning rain, somewhat abated before the time scheduled for the tilt but continued soon after the contest was in progress, soaking the field and making it perilously slippery. The men from down river turned three long runs into touchdowns in a fourth quarter rally after Birmingham had showed fair defense against them until the middle of the third period. The Baldwin line displayed weakness on several occasions during the first half but held the ball from scoring twice when they came within five yards of the stripe.

A Rouge aerial attack that sprouted early in the first quarter had little effect and wilted in the third quarter. Both aggregations pointed to advantage.

Line Fails

Schwartz was hampered frequently by men who trampled the Birmingham line and often failed completely to punt or pass. The fourth period saw River Rouge totally outclass the visitors though the Maroons gathered some yardage on punts and passes. Baldwin was driven for many losses, had its line broken, and lost several plays because of injuries.

Birmingham ran a total of seven first downs to the opponents' 9. Schwartz opened the game with a kick-off to Camel on the 30 yard line, who advanced only six yards. From the 35 yard line, River Rouge began an aerial attack which continued at intervals throughout the game when Cox threw an incomplete pass to Schultz. Punting with the wind, Cox sent the pigskin 50 yards. Gure and Schwartz took the ball to the 24 yard mark.

After Cox fumbled a punt from Schwartz of Birmingham, the Maroon line broke and McNew went through for 12 yards and a first down. McNew tried again but lost a yard and Cox sent another incomplete pass. Winborn (Concluded on Next Page)
