(Continued from Preceding Page) from a punt. Cox took the 21 yard mark and borrowed five yards off guard while Schwarzze cut off two yards and tipped River Rouge for three and then completed a first down for the Maroons.

Birmingham took the ball and Gore helped himself to five yards. Brieg lost a yard and shortly after the Maroons kicked to his own 45 yard line. Birmingham took another dose of five yards for better off-side. Cox punted to the 20 yard line. The Maroons slashed one yard off-guard. The quarter ended.

Gore Gains

Gore lost one foot on an end drive but came back with four yards to the 41 yard line. River Rouge kicked to the opponents' 34 where McNew broke off two yards for his team. Schultz stepped ahead two paces and Winborn returned Cox's punt to the 50 yard line. Schwarzze reeled nine yards and made more. The referee ruled five yards against Birmingham for being off-side. River Rouge kicked to Maroon kick on the 31 yard line and returned for two. McNew took five yards to the 42 yard line, went around end for a first down, and then fell for a short loss. The Maroons took the ball from Cox and ran for one yard. Winborn rounded end to end the quarter.

A decided change swept over the Maroons in the middle of the third period though they completed several of their first downs in that quarter. Camel scrambled Schwarzze's kick-off eight yards; after which Cox failed in a long pass. Cox took the pigskin to the 35 yard line where McNew got away for five more. River Rouge lost five yards for off-side. McNew the Maroons for no gain. Schwarzze intercepted a 20 yard pass from Cox and went back to the 36 yard line and then crashed for six. Schwarzze got three more, punted to the 28 yard line and Brieg made two. Off-side Cox Birmingham another five strides. River Rouge nailed Schwarzze before he could get a pass off and grabbed the ball on the 30th stripe. Schultz ripped off two yards while Cox and McNew slipped through to the 45. From the 35 Cox punted to the 49 where the Maroons took the ball. Brieg skirted end for 14 yards and a first down. Winborn took the ball to the 30 yard line and Schwarzze cut loose with a 40 yard kick over the goal zone. McNew ran through Birmingham for two yards and pushed the ball to the 45 for River Rouge to end the third quarter.
