SELFISHNESS BAN ASKED BY PASTOR

Sees Reorganization Of Industry As Need For Christianity

Christianity will succeed only in proportion to the degree man can overcome his selfishness, the Rev. F. W. Bostick, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Redford told members of the Lions club at their meeting and luncheon yesterday noon at the First Baptist Church.

He sees the need of the reorganization of business and industry which he believes militates against the individual in his striving toward spiritual perfection.

Because Western civilization recognizes the value of human nature, it stands out over other religions, he declared.

Several songs were sung by Frederick Pitheroe, choirmaster of the First Baptist Church, and a short talk was made on the ministry by the Rev. David Leon Woodward, pastor.

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went into various portions of Birmingham's problems, that it could not get very far unless it had in its possession a sort of master plan to which any recommendation made from time to time would conform. For instance, if they sought to extend the park system, how far should they do so? What will be the future boundaries of the village, and how many people will it contain? How can Birmingham, in the extension of streets and highways, co-ordinate with Pontiac, Detroit, and Oakland County? These were questions that Mr. Comey has answered, thus giving the planning commission, and in turn the village commission, information required in order to meet the public demands economically.

Mr. Comey's recommendations, declared Mr. Parry, are merely guidelines for local officials to follow, if they choose. He suggested that each citizen read the report very carefully, and become acquainted with the future needs of the area. A distinct virtue of Mr. Comey's report was referred to by Mr. Parry when he said that the city expert had, years ago, made the original street plans for Detroit.

Sees Law Need

The necessity of investigating proper zoning was briefly referred to by Mr. Parry, who felt that the community, in order to protect its character, should have some regulatory ordinance covering this problem. After his talk, several Rotarians held an informal discussion, many of whom seemed opposed to bringing up the question of zoning here. One of them, although favorable to the zoning ordinance which was defeated here three years ago, declared himself opposed to the proposition now, since the property across from his home had been made into a store.

Whether or not Birmingham should encourage a certain amount of industry along the new railroad right-of-way was touched upon by Mr. Parry, who stated that, "when you look upon Birmingham from the standpoint of taxes, you must admit the value of industrial growth; but if you look only upon the residential aspects of the case, you will oppose industry coming to Birmingham."

Again quoting Mr. Comey's report, manager Parry said: "Birmingham is as yet a young community; its population of ten or twelve thousand is but a tithe of that which it is likely to have with-

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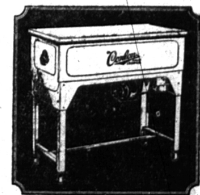
