## CONSERVATION STEPS TAKEN BY COUNTY

Three Agencies Combine To Work Out Hunting Problems  
CLUB OFFICERS NAMED

Organization of an Oakland County Sportsman League is the latest step of three taken by the County toward game conservation. Others are the creation of a Conservation Commission, consisting of three supervisors and three citizens, and the appointment of a full time county conservation officer.

Those on the conservation committee are Supervisors George Mitchell, Joseph Long and J. Guy Newton. On the citizens part of the committee are Judge Dan A. McTaffey, George Weitzel and A. B. Glaspie.

Through the efforts of these, 25 honor men, selected by the sportsmen's organization with approval of the Oakland County commission will hold special deputy licenses and be in communication with the county game warden to notify him of violations and assist him in his work. Their contribution will be without pay but is expected to work a reform in past methods of apprehending game violators within the county.

The new league plans to secure a membership of at least 2,000, charging a membership fee of \$1 each. Each member is required to subscribe to the following pledge: "I do hereby pledge that I will not violate any of the fish and game laws approved by the Conservation Department of the State of Michigan and will uphold and enforce them by notifying someone in authority that said laws are being violated."
